

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FROM THE EDITOR

Over the course of my tenure as Executive Director of the Decoy Museum, I have seen people shake their heads and sigh that today's children do not care about decoys or the glory days of waterfowling on the Susquehanna Flats. In times when hunting is often frowned upon and video games compete with the outdoors for a child's attention, perhaps our younger generations are less enthusiastic about these subjects than children of the past. But I wish all of you could have seen this museum in May or June!

Throughout the spring, the Decoy Museum was invaded daily by flocks of giggling schoolchildren anxious to see what this "decoy business" was all about. They listened with rapt attention to stories about sinkboxes and canvasbacks and fired question after question about market gunning at their docents. They merrily recreated the decoy production process with paper, scissors, glue, and crayons, scurrying to look at decoys in the exhibit cases to make sure that their "decoys" were faithful reproductions. When presented with the opportunity to learn about the area's waterfowling heritage, these children dove into the subject enthusiastically.

Maybe that is the greatest indicator of the Decoy Museum's success. Founded by individuals who were concerned that this heritage of decoys and waterfowl hunting would soon be lost, this institution reaches almost 20,000 people — many of them youngsters — with a message of appreciation and preservation of waterfowling culture.

As some of you have probably learned, this will be my last issue as editor of *The Canvasback*. By the time the magazine reaches your mailboxes, I will have assumed a position in the Education Department of the Maryland Historical Society, where I will be working to bring the history of the state alive for schoolchildren. I am proud to have been able to serve the Decoy Museum and make some contributions to its development. Like all organizations, the Decoy Museum has issues to overcome,

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EVENT WRAP-UP

20TH ANNIVERSARY DECOY & WILDLIFE ART FESTIVAL

My, how time flies when you're having fun!

On May 4, 5, and 6, the Havre de Grace Decoy Museum hosted its twentieth annual Decoy & Wildlife Art Festival! Started in 1981 as a means to raise funds to found a decoy museum in the "Decoy Capital of the World," the Festival draws almost 200 exhibitors and over 4,000 visitors annually and continues to be the museum's most important fundraiser.

This year, the Festival Committee elected to recognize Charles Nelson Barnard as Honorary Chairman. One of the Upper Bay's most renowned carvers of the early twentieth century, Barnard is known for blending the Harford County and Cecil County carving styles and producing exceptionally simple but elegant high-head canvasbacks. Although Mr. Barnard received this honor posthumously, members of his immediate family were present throughout the Festival to share their memories of this carving legend. Charles Nelson's son, Homer Barnard and family members, Nelson Berg, Harry and Shirley Graves, Fred Berg, and Betty and Alfred Bucchi worked with the museum's curator in the weeks prior to the Festival to create a videotape of the family's reminiscences for the public to enjoy. Several family members also loaned

the museum artifacts ranging from axes and whittling knives to decoys for a special tribute display to Charles Nelson Barnard.

Decoy expert, C. John Sullivan, generously loaned the museum over two dozen exceptional examples of Barnard's work for an exhibit; on from May through September. Among the artifacts on display are six high-head canvasbacks, nine traditional canvasbacks (including the last full-sized decoy he ever made), four black ducks, two lesser scaups, and two redheads. These decoys are accompanied by Barnard's own toolbox, tools, patterns, and other personal effects. A special reception was held on the Friday evening of the Festival to allow exhibitors the opportunity to enjoy this special exhibit while catching up with old friends. Visitors were delighted to see such a fine assemblage of Barnard decoys.

A collection of sixty-four rare antique decoys from the Upper Chesapeake Bay complimented the Barnard exhibit. Among the artifacts on display were a Jim Holly canvasback drake (c. 1920), a pair of Sam Barnes canvasbacks (c. 1910), a Daddy Holly redhead (c. 1860), a Ben Dye blue-winged teal drake (c. 1890), a pair of high-neck Barnard canvasbacks, and a C.T. Wilson blue-winged teal drake. Visitors enjoyed the opportunity to compare the old masters' styles and appreciate these rare pieces of folk art. Thanks to John Clayton, Henry Fleckenstein, William Smart, Vance Strausberg, Mark Holocheck, and Dr. John Carriere for so generously sharing these treasures from their collections.

Another new feature of the Festival this year was a presentation by writer Corinne Litzenberg. Author of a series of educational and entertaining children's books set on the Susquehanna Flats, Ms. Litzenberg shared her inspiration for the stories and some details of the writing and publishing processes with an audience of families during a multi-media talk. The youngsters in the group were especially intrigued by puppets representing Ms. Litzenberg's characters.

Another first for the Festival was the addition of a River Gunning Decoy Division to the Carving Competi-

tion. In addition to the Gunning Decoy contest judged in tanks at the high school, there was a contest in which gunning decoys were judged in the waters of the Susquehanna Flats just outside the Decoy Museum. Entries had to be hunting decoys, full-size or larger, with a painting style that was simple enough to be touched up by the average hunter. The River Gunning Decoy Contest had 150 entries and is sure to become a staple of the Festival competition.

The other standard divisions of the Decoy Festival's carving competition were similarly successful. In fact, the competition attracted two more entrants and twenty-one more entries than last year! The carvings submitted for the contest were as impressive as always. It was hard to believe that some of the entries submitted in the novice division were not the work of master artists! Congratula-

tions to all who entered the competition. For the names of the competition's award-winners, please see the listing found later in this magazine.

The museum always relies on the Festival's live and silent auctions to generate both funds and excitement, and this year's auctions did not let us down. Although the live auction contained a record number of lots and the auditorium's air conditioning failed, the decoys being offered enticed many bidders to stay until the last item was sold. Participants seemed pleased with the auction's mixture of contemporary and antique decoys. Look for the auction's prices realized list elsewhere in this magazine. Thanks to the very generous contributions made by our exhibitors, the silent auction was extraordinarily successful this year, raising more money than in any previous year.

Perhaps the aspect of the Festival that most delighted visitors was the series of retriever demonstrations. On the lawn just outside the Decoy Museum, Vicky Trainor of Oakdale Retrievers led her dogs through exercises designed to train them to retrieve waterfowl brought down by the hunter's shotgun. It is always exciting to watch these talented and enthusiastic retrievers perform. Be sure to see Ms. Trainor and her friends at the Duck Fair in September!

As always, the Festival Committee owes a debt of gratitude to its Past Honorary Chairmen for donating their time in support of the event. Capt. Harry Jobes, Capt. Bill Collins, Jim Pierce, Bill and Allan Schauber, Harry V. Shourds, Ron Rue, and members of the Barnard family were all on hand to greet the public during Saturday's Autograph and Postal Stamp Cancellation Session. Visi-

tors could have their copies of the Festival issue *The Canvasback* signed while chatting with the legends. High School Poster Contest winner Ambyr Hodges was also present and signing her poster.

As a special treat, 1984 Chairman Charles Bryan spent the weekend working in the museum's R. Madison Mitchell workshop. Guests could watch him paint redhead drakes that will be offered as the second in the Decoy Museum's annual series of limited edition decoys. These birds will be offered for sale at the museum's Anniversary Dinner in November. It is always a pleasure to spend time with Mr. Bryan as he works, as anyone who visited him during the Festival can attest.

And, of course, the Festival would never exist without its exhibitors and visitors. This year, 179 individuals, businesses, and organizations set up displays. Items offered for sale ranged from handmade fishing lures to wildlife sculptures, from antique working decoys to intricate decorative carvings. Theses masterpieces were very much admired by the over 4,000 visitors who attended this year's event.

The Havre de Grace Decoy Museum extends a heart-felt thank you to everyone associated with the 20th Anniversary Decoy & Wildlife Art Festival — our exhibitors, our volunteers, our Committee members, and our guests. Thank you for making this extraordinary event possible. We are already working on next year's Festival with the important goal of increasing attendance by both exhibitors and patrons. The Festival Committee is holding monthly meetings and would like to invite anyone interested in helping with the 2002 Festival to attend. Decoy Museum Recognized by Chesapeake Bay Gateways Network

In June, the Havre de Grace Decoy Museum was officially named a Gateway Site in the Chesapeake Bay Gateways Network. The Gateways Network is a system of places where people can learn about and enjoy the natural, cultural, and recreational resources of the Chesapeake Bay. Administered by the National Park Service, this program outlines goals and functions around which Bayrelated sites in Maryland, Pennsylvania, and Virginia can organize. Close cooperation among the participating sites is encouraged, and the Chesapeake Bay Program Office works to market the network as a whole and each site individually to the public.

Inclusion in the Gateways Network will benefit the Havre de Grace Decoy Museum in many ways. First, it is expected that museum attendance will rise as people who visit other Gateways sites around the Bay receive information on our institution. Second, membership in this alliance will open up opportunities for programmatic collaboration with other institutions, such as the Chesapeake Bay Maritime Museum and the Ward Museum of Wild-

fowl Art. Third, professionals with the Chesapeake Bay Program office will be available to advise the museum. And finally, Gateways sites are eligible to compete for matching grants from the National Park Service.

Opening of New R. Madison Mitchell Exhibit

On Friday, March 30, 2001, eighty friends of the Havre de Grace Decoy Museum celebrated the formal opening of the tribute exhibit to R. Madison Mitchell in the "Honoring the Masters" gallery on the museum's second floor. Among those in attendance for the ceremony were Madelyn Mitchell Shank, Mr. Mitchell's daughter, and her family and R. Madison Mitchell Jr., and his family. Actually, four generations of R. Madison Mitchell's were present! Chuck Robbins, author of R. Madison Mitchell: His Life and Decoys and Mitchell's close friend, was the evening's featured speaker.

The event began at 7:00 p.m. with a reception and ribbon-cutting ceremony. A crowd gathered to watch R. 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
Ice Dreams

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

The Jobes Family



The history of decoy making is the story of a genuine folk art, its timeless traditions passed down from generation to generation. It is the story of eager young men who are happy to spend their spare time sweeping floors or sanding heads for the opportunity to learn the magic of the masters. For those who grew up playing in the sawdust of their fathers' workshops, the allure of the craft is

especially strong. And when sons share their fathers' talent and passion, the result can be a veritable decoy making dynasty.

Such is the case with the Jobes family of Havre de Grace, Maryland. Born to a man whose essence is defined by memories of bushwhacking on the Susquehanna Flats and sharing workspace with the famed R. Madison






Pair of wood ducks by Capt. Harry Jobes, 1988.

Mitchell, the sons of Captain Harry Jobes were destined to be avid watermen and skilled decoy makers. Almost before these boys could read and write their own names, they were helping in their father's workshop. And today, birds made by one of the three Jobes brothers are coveted nearly as much as those of Capt. Harry.

Of course, to tell this story properly, one must begin with the career of the spirited Capt. Harry Jobes. Born in Havre de Grace in 1936, Harry was fascinated with decoys and waterfowl from a very young age. He was wandering down to Charles Nelson Barnard's workshop two blocks from home to sand heads between "wrassling" matches and to watch Barnard work by the age of eight or nine. When Barnard passed away, Harry found another

workshop — that of none other than R. Madison Mitchell.

Interestingly, Madison Mitchell himself didn't actually hire the young Harry. Harry had met Mitchell's wife, Helen, at an art show contest in which he had entered one of his earliest decoys. Mrs. Mitchell was impressed with the youngster's raw talent and energy and offered Harry a job working for her husband, which Harry declined in consideration of his relationship with Mr. Barnard. Upon Barnard's death a short time later, Harry went to the Mitchell home and was hired on the spot by Helen Mitchell. With the spunk characteristic of so many carvers' wives, Mrs. Mitchell then went to tell her husband that Harry would be working for him.


The association would last twenty-eight years and be the most influential in Harry's career. He began working in Mitchell's shop for twenty-five cents an hour after school, sweeping floors, shaping bodies with the spoke shave and drawknife, and puttying. Gradually, he learned every aspect of decoy production. He studied the techniques of all the men working in the shop — Bailey Moltz, Bud McKinney, Cats Wilson, Jim Pierce, Bob Matthews, Titbird Bauer, and Ed Sampson. Harry credits Bailey Moltz with teaching him to whittle heads, but Mitchell's influence on his painting style is obvious.


Harry worked with Mitchell on a part-time basis until the early 1970s. He supported his family through other, more conventional methods. He ran research vessels for Maryland and Virginia and piloted a patrol boat off the shores of the Aberdeen Proving Ground. And for forty-three years, Captain Harry operated his own charter boat. Ultimately, in 1985, Harry retired from these endeavors and turned to carving full-time in his Aberdeen, Maryland workshop.


In the meantime, of course, Harry was busy raising a family. And, predictably, all three Jobes boys took up carving at very young ages. No later than the age of seven, Bob, Charles, and finally Joey were performing simple tasks in their father's shop. They began by drawing the

center lines on sawed out heads, spoke-shaving bodies, sweeping floors, and pulling the nails out of the cedar telephone pole wood that their father preferred for his bodies. Gradually, they were allowed to putty, prime, and sand. Like their father before them, it did not take much time for the boys to learn to competently complete all of the steps involved in decoy production.

Harry Jobes was not the only influence on the development of Bob, Charles, and Joey's carving skills. These boys grew up in the midst of a rich carving community, and they learned from a diverse range of people. Each of the brothers had the privilege of knowing and learning from R. Madison Mitchell. In fact, at a relatively young age, Bob left his father's workshop to draw-knife for Mitchell, and Mitchell was Charles' godfather. But each brother had other influences as well. For Bob, another major influence was Jim Pierce, for whom he worked for a time. For Joey, Pat Vincenti was an influence.

Like their father, each of the Jobes boys was drawn as much to the water as to decoy carving. Bobby, Charles, and Joey all worked as commercial watermen after graduation from high school, but each found that making a living fishing and crabbing has become almost impossible in recent years. Full-time decoy making supplemented by some fishing and crabbing presented itself as a more practical career option.

Today, all three brothers operate their own decoy shops. Bob first opened his own business in 1980, and Charles joined him in that shop a short time later. By the late 1980s, Charles had opened his own shop. After working with Pat Vincenti for several years, Joey opened his own shop in 1987. Today, all three businesses are thriving, with a good measure of help from the women of the family.

Naturally, decoys produced by Jobes family members exhibit many similarities. Father and sons all prefer white pine and cedar, and all of their bodies are machine-turned. Another characteristic of Jobes decoys is the absence of a shelf where the breast meets the neck. Although at one time Bob specialized in miniatures, Charles specialized in

half-size decoys, and Joey specialized in full-size birds, all three gentlemen now regularly produce a variety of sizes.

In recognition of the remarkable productivity and skill of the members of this local decoy-making dynasty, the Havre de Grace Decoy Museum will honor all four carvers of the Jobes family — Capt. Harry, Capt. Bob, Charles, and Joey — as the 2001 Duck Fair Honorary Chairmen. Each of these gentlemen is a very talented and highly respected carver in his own right, and to have an entire family of such masters is something special indeed. In fact, one could draw parallels with the nineteenth century's Holly family of Havre de Grace.

Already the next generation of Jobes carvers is in training. Charles and Bobby's sons can already be found whittling heads and sanding bodies. With their genes and all the free lessons a boy could ever want from the masters, the future of the Jobes carving dynasty looks promising indeed.




