

Bill Veasey is best known as a carver, teacher and writer. One of his proudest accomplishments is knowing that three of his four children are going forward with the tradition of his field. During the course of his teaching years, his students have won hundreds, if not thousands, of ribbons and awards. Many of Bill's students have gone on to become a force in the field of carving by carrying on his tradition of teaching others to carve, writing books on the subject and actively competing with their own carvings. Bill has had the pleasure of teaching students from all over the world.

He is particularly proud of the fact that he has helped inspire and guide many of his students to carry on the tradition of teaching. Bill has been instrumental in creating literature for the field, both by writing his own books and by assisting others with the process of getting published through recommendations to his publisher. Through the years, Bill has had the pleasure of competing,

and often winning, awards in shows across the United States from Ocean City, MD to San Diego, CA and from Thousand Islands NY to Atlanta, GA.

In Bill Veasey's early years he did compete and win many awards for his carvings. He has two particularly memorable awards, both from Havre de Grace. "I am known as a decorative carver, however, the first two years of the hunting decoy contest in Havre de Grace, I won Best of Show!"

In closing, Bill shares that "it has been my privilege to have been a part of this exciting and energizing field and to have been able to help shape it through writing and teaching. The relationships I have developed all over the country will be treasured forever, for they have enriched my life. Bob Biddle, my friend and brother in law, initiated me into this wonderful life. I will be forever grateful."

As a part of this article, Bill asked a number of close friends, relatives and associates to give a thumbnail sketch of their perceptions and experiences of and with "Bill Veasey, friend, carver, teacher and writer......" These sketches follow and Bill thanks them for their participation with this article.

Bob Biddle -True Friend, Carver, Collector, Brother-in-law

During the 45 years that I've known Bill Veasey, we have hunted together, fished together, carved together, and generally enjoyed each other's company. In the early 70's we competed with each other in the decorative carving show competitions which brings to mind a story: Around 1975, Bill and I were putting the finishing touches on some competition birds at my house. Bill was at the workbench painting and I had just set three of my completed entries to the left on a low file cabinet when Bill turned around quickly and upset his palette right onto my birds. Back then we were painting with acrylics and a quick trip to the wash sink saved the day. I still kid Bill that he was trying to eliminate the competition but I'm sure it was an accident.

In years to come, Bill will be remembered for his elegant carvings, but I think he will be most remembered for his encouragement and sharing of information with new carvers. Over the years Bill has introduced countless individuals, from

preteens to octogenarians, to bird carving. He has enabled each and every one to experience the joys and satisfaction of turning a chunk of wood into a piece resembling one of Nature's beautiful creations.

Jim Dodd - True Friend, Carver, Sportsman

Teacher

To me, Bill's greatest thrill in carving is to have his students win ribbons by competing in the many decoy contests around the region and country. For many years, Bill would personally, carefully pack 20, 25, 30 or more student decoys and take them to shows and personally enter each one for the contest. After the show was over he would once again repack each decoy for the long ride home. Bill was and is proud of every one of his students; type of ribbon doesn't matter, best in show to honorable mention or no ribbon, he is always able to make the student feel good about his accomplishment, at whatever level. Because he knew and we knew that he got the best his student could do, on that particular decoy.

Hunter

To me, Bill is not the greatest hunter for world has ever seen. However, he makes up for that by being a great hunting companion. Many years ago, Bill and I were invited to hunt ducks in December, on a beautiful Delaware marsh. The morning of the hunt came and it was unseasonably warm so Bill shed a lot of his layers and left them back in the truck, but not without warning, that maybe he shouldn't do that. Along about 9 AM the weather changed and a cold front moved in. We are in the blind and about 40 minutes by boat to the truck, when the ducks started flying. The temperature was falling 10 degrees every half hour. Bill was shivering so hard that he scared the ducks off because his teeth were clicking so loud. We let him suffer until he couldn't talk which was sort of neat anyway and then took him back to a hot bowl of soup at noon to revive him. Needless to say that since then, Bill has been known to sit in a blind and loose up to 5 pounds from sweating with all of those layers on.



Friend

To me, Bill is a true, loyal, friend. In my life I've had two unbearable tragedies and each time the same five friends came to my rescue. Someday I will honor each one of them as I am honoring Bill in these very few words. Bill was there, he was supportive, he was compassionate, he gave me strength, but more than anything he was then, and is today, a true, loyal friend.

Patrick Vincenti - Friend, Decoy maker

When you speak of carving on the Upper Chesapeake Bay, no matter whether you are discussing decoys from years past or decorative carvings, there are only a handful of people over the years that have had a major impact on the art of carving. Bill Veasey is certainly one of these talented and giving people.

Over the past 25 years I have had the fortune of benefiting from his knowledge and experience. In the early 1970's Bill Collins attended one of Veasey's carving classes. I asked the question "why?" Bill's answer was "to broaden my carving ability." When he finished the coarse, he brought techniques of sharpening tools and using other power tools into a craft that had, up until that time, been very labor intensive. We are still using these techniques today.

When Jeannie and I saw there was a need for carving supply source in the area, I went to Bill Veasey for his advice. Without any hesitation, he was there for us. Bill shared his ideas on inventory and suppliers. When contacting these people it because very evident what a dominant figure he was. From writing books to helping to create Jo Sonjas line of carvers' colors and being instrumental in the design of the Detail Master Burner. Last but not least, the long list of carvers that were taught or influenced by him, George Walker, Phil English, Jan Calvert and Jeff Moore, just to mention a few.

Over the years Bill Veasey has been a major contributor to several organizations. In 1999 the Havre de Grace Decoy Museum received a large collection of decoys from Bill. Bill Veasey, Master Carver

Twenty some years ago I went to a carving show. I saw this beautiful carved duck and asked how much it cost. When the man behind the table told me, I was floored. I knew nothing about this topic at that time. It was really nice and I wanted it but my response was, "I'll carve one myself first." Well, that man was Bill Veasey. I should have bought that duck and never looked back because I have spent much more than the price he was asking several times over in my pursuit of carving a duck as good as that one was.

Since that time I have carved with a few different people here and there and spanning over time I carved a total of eight birds. Bill Veasey taught all the people I carved with. Well finally after not carving for 10 years, my wife convinced me to quit talking about it and go do it. She contacted Bill, the next thing I know I'm finishing a bird in record time for me. That bird won several 1st place ribbons in four states. I have since carved several more birds and every single one of them has won something and one even went Best of Show.

I owe all this to Bill and my wife. Bill is a great teacher, mentor and friend. One of the biggest enjoyments about carving is going to Bill's and just sit around and hear the stories of the old time carvers, the history of some of the biggest shows in our sport and how Bill sees things in general. Sometimes it reminds me of pictures we all see of the Ward Brothers sitting outside their ship with other people just talking. We should get a picture of us doing the same thing I guess. His experience is one of a kind. Who else in the sport has been able to accomplish the things he has? He has been heavily involved in the sport for over 30 years and has helped get some of the best shows we have off the ground. He has had influence on more people's carvings than anyone since the Ward Brothers and God. The list of people who have carved, at one time or another, in Bill's shop is large and always growing. Some of the best carvers have come out of his shop, better carvers. Bill just takes it all in his stride. He is proud to be able to help people become their best. He told me recently the two things he is the most proud of are, the books that he has written and helped other's write and that his influence can be seen in every carving show there is. That to me tells me everything about the man he is. He isn't

prideful or boastful as some in this sport can be. He doesn't brag about his many victories in life and sport. He doesn't promote bad rumors about other people just so he might look better. He is humble, kind and compassionate and truly does just want to help us all become our best.

The more I know him the more I think that 20 some years ago, if I were not such a wise mouth, I would have had another conversation with him. Instead of saying, "I'll carve one myself first." I would say, "Can you teach me how to do this?" After all this time, he was the one teaching me, through other people, anyway. Sometimes I even think he knew way back then that I would be carving with him sooner or later. I forgot to mention his patience.

I will never regret that I finally did catch up with Bill and start learning. Not just carving but many other things. If there is any pride in the shop, it is mine. Pride that I am capable of doing this and pride in who I am carving with. I'm even proud that I was asked to contribute this story. One of the biggest things I am proud of is I am getting to know the man Bill Veasey, not just the carver.

He's a man capable of extraordinary things and inexplicably incapable of some exceptionally ordinary things. Like waiting in a McDonald's line is a task completely beyond his capabilities. Patience is not a virtue in his extensively researched assessment of affairs. While he may, from time-totime, admire a person who possesses it, for the most part he'd more likely consider the patient ones to be blind followers of

an untested doggerel which sharper minds would immediately grasp as an anesthetizing trap. The degree to which we put up with and surrender to and are forced to deal with ineptitude and a general increase in apathy in our society and the lengths to which these maladies inconvenience and challenge our daily existence boggles his sharp and sometimes unforgiving mind. Perhaps it is the very forgiving, patient and accepting "virtues" of the many that perpetuate and allow these same failures we find so rampant today. Clearly my thinking has been influenced by this man. It has been observed from time-to-time through history that a great many things can be accomplished by those whose actions are not motivated by a desire for credit. This is likely part of the reason Bill has accomplished and influenced so much in the field of carving. He has been so willing to give, build and contribute without acknowledgement of any kind that more often than not - he hasn't received any! He has directly caused so much advancement in the field of waterfowl carving. Not only at shows and with D.U. chapters all over the country but especially by the widespread interest in learning carving that his early willingness to teach the absolute beginner in a huge scale produced. While Bill dropped out of the competition circuit early after capturing many blues; his students, guided by his extensive knowledge of his craft and his commitment to excellence and accuracy. collected hundreds of ribbons at all the competitions. Many have so deeply embraced this unique phenomenon of 'craft growing up to be art' - that we have had the privilege of being part of in our lifetime that they have made careers of carving and teaching themselves. For me, the most telling of qualities one can examine about another is their influence upon their environment and those around them. There can be no doubt that this man will leave an extensive mark, the depth of which few in the industry will ever know. If I were to simply list the actions he's taken directly over the last 30 years to strengthen and enhance the field of wildfowl carving in the often fickle eye of the public, I would need an entire magazine.

On a personal note; he is, unfailingly and without exception, the most honorable person I have ever known. For me, the world falls woefully short in comparison. I am, on occasion, saddened that, though acknowledgement and praise were never his motivators, there has not yet been some grand gesture on the part of the collective industry of carving to which he has tirelessly and selflessly contributed, that would begin to match all he has given. Much honor and monument has been lavished on some in the field who won a few grand awards, or did a lot for this show/museum or that. Not much has been said of one who has inarguably contributed more to more areas of the field than Bill Veasey. Every person who plays or works in the field benefits from all he has done. Does the currant winner of the World Class Miniature Decorative Division at the Ward Foundation's Carving Competition even know that Bill Veasey not only conceived of that division but carved the master for the sterling silver flock of flying miniature geese that was auctioned off to pay for it's first winner? Did you know? Multiply that by a lot and you will have a sense of the extent of this man's real work.



Vincent A. Ciesielski - Friend, Carver

I have had an interest in carved decoys for years; marveled at the carving, painting, and displaying of decorative types. The paint and brushes were generic but the videos were "Carving, Texturing, and Painting a Preening Green Wing Teal Drake" with William Veasey. In the dedication of a book written by D.G. Perch, author Perch penned the following: "It is better to share knowledge that one gain's than to keep it to oneself." This describes Bill Veasey.

Bill Veasev the man:

Husband, Father, Family man. Bill has been an excellent provider for his family. His various endeavors including musician, auctioneer, international known author, businessman, teacher.

Bill Veasey the sculptor artist:

Bill is one of the sought after carvers for his detailed decorative and working decoys. His carvings are both in private as well as museum collections. Perhaps unknown to many of his fans, Bill is an excellent flat painter, depicting waterfowl in various forms of flight and environments. Through his desire to excel in his artistry, Bill, unsatisfied with the early means and tools of the craft, contacted his long-time friend and together developed the "Detail Master" burning system. Used by many top-notch carvers today.

Bill Veasey the teacher:

The pioneer in the field of putting to print the comprehensive, step-by-step instructions by which one can carve, detail,

and paint waterfowl; Bill has been called "Dean of American Bird carving teachers." Bill has taught thousands of students through out the country. Many of Bill's students have become some of today's best known carvers, teachers, authors, and blue ribbon winners in carving competitions across the nation. These students will attest to Bill as a mentor. Two of Bill's favorite dictums of carving for every student are "When you think you have enough paint on your brush, you already have too much." And important to all beginners when questioning their confidence, "We all began where you are." To his past and present students, Bill is truly a teacher in all aspects and nuances of the word.

Doug David - Friend, Carver

About 30 years ago, I called Bill to sign up for duck carving class - and I showed up 30 years later.

Bill says I should come to class twice a week to make up for lost time - he really means lost revenue. Bill has helped with 17 ducks in one year. His favorite words are "hurry up" and in the same breath, "slow down."

I read a book called "Carney." There was a whole chapter on Carney man, Mr. Bill Veasey. The writer said he spent a whole month with Bill selling from the back of a pickup truck - with overlapping statements about everything. The writer goes on to say to this day he didn't know what Bill was doing. It takes a duck carver to know one.

Bill Veasey is a great teacher and a good friend.

Peter B. Schiffer - Friend, Publisher

I came to know of Bill Veasey by way of Ken Basil, the head of the Ward Foundation. I asked Ken who was the best waterfowl carving teacher, with students winning the most blue ribbons. Ken immediately said, "Bill Veasey." I went out to meet Bill for a book idea we had on waterfowl carving which was accomplished with many stories, besides his own personal stories that only a showman, great personality, and a gifted carver himself could tell.

A short time after his landmark book was out and selling well, I approached Bill for a waterfowl painting book, which he told me could not be done. A short time later, I called him and asked how he was progressing. As I knew he would, Bill had found a unique way to present painting instructions, and we produced a truly wonderful book. Bill has brought wonderful authors to us, in numerous fields, who all want to share their knowledge or experience and make this world just a little better. He seems to attract people who have talent, and he shows them how to use it in so many ways.

Shannon Dimmig - Friend, Carver, Protégé

Bill has had many challenges in his life, but the most difficult one occurred on Thursday before the Ward World Competition in 1999. Bill had a stroke. After three days in the hospital he came home. The next morning he was in the shop as usual.

The stroke had affected his right side. He had difficulty walking, speaking, but most importantly he had lost the grip in his right hand - and was unable to hold a pencil, a fordome knife, or a paintbrush.

He started rehabilitation immediately. Every morning he would sit in the shop and carefully write his name over and over on the craft paper that covered the tables, struggling with every letter.

He attacked his therapy like his life depended on it. The spring loaded hand exerciser became an extension of his own body and worked on building hand strength non-stop. He learned his exercises and did them every day, several times. He found humor in the silly sounds he made during his speech exercises.

During all of this he never missed teaching his carving classes, even teaching a three-day seminar for 11 people, with some help, the weekend after he came home from the hospital.

Bill set little goals for himself daily and worked hard to achieve them. One of his biggest goals was to be able to conduct the annual auction at the Clayton N.Y. show six weeks later in July. He conducted that auction, and he was as witty, funny, and confident as ever.

Bill proved what he always said was true - hard work and dedication makes one a winner. He never gave up. "Just Do It" is his favorite thing to say (long before Nike stole it). He set a terrific example for everyone around him.

We are as carvers, art appreciators and human beings, fortunate that we still have him here - teaching, encouraging, and guiding us through our various projects, helping us to achieve what we never imagined we would.

Thanks, Bill for showing us what courage is, and determination, and most of all for just being you - a winner in every sense of the word.

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
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
