FROM THE DIRECTOR




Dear Museum Family,

Frank's Currituck style decoys are beautiful, and are cherished by those who collect them. Frank Muller is a good friend of the museum, and supports the Decoy Festival and the Duck Fair each year by donating a canvas swan and goose to the auctions. Frank was welcomed by many who visited the fair, and he was pleasant to all who stopped by to see him, graciously explaining the history and construction of his style of decoys.

The fair's silent auction proved to be a great gathering spot. Every visitor dropped by and either placed a bid on one of the many items offered, or just sat in the shade and visited with silent auctioneers, Madelyn and Mitch Shank. Bryon grew up in Harford County, Maryland and currently lives in Churchville. He is a 1981 graduate of Bel Air High School and graduated in 1985 from Washington College with a degree in biology. Bryon is presently making decoys as a full time occupation.

Bryon's enthusiasm was sparked by his father's interest in antique decoys and hunting in the Havre de Grace area. Bryon's style is patterned after the classic working decoys produced by carvers such as R. Madison Mitchell, Paul Gibson, Charlie Bryan, and Bob McGaw. The traditional working birds (gunning decoys) are characterized by their flat paint, absence of raised feathers, and presence of ballast weights and anchor rings.

Bryon began carving a few duck heads in 1977. In the early 1980's he spent three years in apprenticeship under Jim (Jimmy) Pierce, a renowned Havre de Grace decoy maker. Now Bryon produces in his own style, birds native to the Atlantic flyway. He carves the hen and drake of about 16 species of ducks. The Canada goose, snow goose, blue goose, and swan are the larger species that he makes.

Bryon is featured in the book *Upper Chesapeake Bay Decoys And Their Makers* by Hagan & Hagan. Bryon's decoys have been shown in the Havre de Grace Decoy Festival, the Waterfowl Show at the Harford Day School, The Chestertown Wildlife Show, The Upper Shore Decoy Show, The Easton Waterfowl Show and other shows in Maryland, New Jersey and Pennsylvania. Bryon has been involved with Ducks Unlimited, Izaak Walton League of America and Otter Point Creek Alliance. Bryon is currently serving as the vice-president and membership director of the Harford County Chapter of the Izaak Walton League of America. He spends a great deal of time at the Chapter's Melvin G. Bosely Wildlife Conservancy, especially working with the wood duck nesting program. Bosely Conservancy is also part of the Chesapeake Bay National Estuarine Research Reserve in Maryland—in which he is a volunteer.

In 1994, Bryon was named the Volunteer Carver of the Year by the Havre de Grace Decoy Museum for his work with school groups.

His blackhead decoy was selected as the Maryland state bird for Ducks Unlimited in 1983. In 1998 his antique Canvasback drake was selected by the Maryland Ducks Unlimited. Bryon is a life member of the Izaak Walton League of America, the Havre de Grace Decoy Museum and the Upper Bay Museum.

In addition to making decoys, Bryon enjoys hunting, crabbing and working on his family's Christmas tree farm.

en Clodfelter and his wife, Shirl, lived on Gettings Avenue in Baltimore for 49 years and had celebrated 60 years of marriage. They had two children, Janis Bahner of Baltimore, and Wood Clodfelter of Jupiter, FL. They also had two grandchildren, Lt. Comd. Christopher Bahner of Seattle, Washington,



and Jessica Ports, also of Jupiter, FL. Ken and Shirl were additionally blessed with one great grandchild, Lea Kathryn Bahner. Bertie Krause, who shared more than fifty years of friendship with Ken and Shirl, was also like a member of their family.

I first met Ken in 1982 at a mutual friend's house, having been invited to an evening of carving decoys. Ken had been carving for some time and had coauthored a book with Ed Cassedy on "How to Carve a Green Wing Teal." This initial meeting led to many years of friendship between us.

Whenever anyone met Ken, he always offered a handshake with an impish grin. He clearly let you know that he enjoyed your company. There were three things you could count on from Ken: he often talked about Shirl and their family; he loved his church; and, he was fiercely proud of being a U.S. Marine. Ken was stationed in Okinawa during World War II, and the words "Semper Fi" were often heard coming from his lips.

Ken had assembled many study books of song birds, birds of prey and ducks. When his eyesight was failing him, he donated these books to the Havre de Grace Decoy Museum. Ken's books are kept in the carving classroom at the museum for future carvers to use and study. Ken's daughter, Jan, called me after Ken's funeral and said that her dad had miscellaneous tools and cutouts which he wanted the Decoy Museum to have as well, to assist fledgling carvers with their new hobby.

My good friend Ken was always trying to help others. He will surely be missed by all who knew him.

Captain John Smith's Shallop

The Captain John Smith shallop made a return visit to the Upper Chesapeake Bay on July 22nd. A shallop was the type of vessel used by Captain Smith to explore the shallow waterways of the Chesapeake Bay. Originally built on his arrival to Jamestown, it was essentially a 12 man row boat. Chesapeake regions' early history was documented by Smith in his journals and by the journals of his crew.

The Decoy Museum hosted a continental breakfast for the visiting dignitaries, affording them a beautiful view of the shallop's arrival. This was the midway point of the re-enactment of the cruise. On this leg of its journey, the vessel traveled from Perryville and Port Deposit, where it was visiting on Friday and Saturday. The ship made dock at the Tydings Park Marina in Havre de Grace at approximately 10 a.m. She was greeted by Havre de Grace Mayor Wayne Dougherty and City Council members, Senator Ben Cardin, Congressman Dutch Ruppersberger, and County Executive David Craig. The day was filled with the sounds of the Maritime Museum's Marifest, a waterfront festival which took place over the course of the weekend. The Decoy Museum set up an exhibit on the promenade where children had the opportunity to take part in one of the on going activities by making a cattail decoy or coloring a wetlands preservation flyer. Many people followed up their visit by going into the museum and exploring the wonderful exhibits inside.

If you missed the shallop's visit, you may have a chance to see the ship next summer. Plans are underway for the 400th Anniversary of Captain John Smith's original voyage.

Collecting COL

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"Look at those two birds sitting there together, no question who made them and when they were made," and then I tell them the "story."

Trecently had the former President of the Havre de Grace Decoy Museum Board of Directors, Patrick Vincenti, stop by the house with a Connecticut couple who are relatively new decoy collectors. The purpose of the visit was to look at some of my cast iron sinkbox decoys. I have some of them, and I think they are great companions to my sinkbox. I display a group of cast iron Hollys in the box. My guests brought along a three-ring binder with color photos of the iron decoys in their collection. After looking around the house at some of my things and listening to some of my stories, we sat down in the living room to look at photos of their collection and make comparisons to various decoys of mine. The purpose of our discussion was an effort to fine-tune the attribution of some of these historic relics. Throughout the visit, as we walked past this item or that, Patrick would comment, "How do you keep all of this straight?" My typical response is that I just know where it is and where it came from. I came to realize many years ago that behind every item in my custody I have a story. The stories are not just about what the item is but whose it was, where it came from, how and where it was used, and how it came to be mine. My son John was traveling with me in my arms before he walked and beside me from his days as a toddler to this current day. So he can tell the same stories about these things that I tell. What I enjoy now is having my grandsons ask "Where did

this or that decoy come from?" and "do you have an extra one of those for the shelf in my bedroom?" During this most recent visit, I listened to my new friends telling stories about the decoys pictured in their album. It strikes me that this couple likes the "stuff" as much as I do and they enjoy telling the tales of where it came from, where it was used, and how it came to be theirs. My biggest fear is that Pat will garner too much from the stories and go back to my sources. I pick up a wing duck and show it to my guests-"What do you think this one is?" Then I tell them that this one was carved by my son and painted by Captain Bobby Jobes for a school project when John was in high school. I pick up the Charles Nelson Barnard coot and place it next to a Barnard blackduck-same tail, same jaunty attitude, same crisply defined paddle tail. "Look at those two birds sitting there together, no question who made them and when they were made," and then I tell them the "story." The Barnard coot story, how the decoy left Havre de Grace, is too sad for me to recall here, but I feel that the coot finally came home to rest near its kin from an earlier day.


Now we examine the Charles T. Wilson cast iron teal. We hold first one and then another next to the wooden one. No doubts or questions of the maker or the time period—it was obviously carved during the same time period of the casting. We admire that great form. They all look as if they could swim away. Patrick knows the story behind the wooden one. But one of the swimming iron teal was one I had admired in the various houses that Henry Fleckenstein had lived in. It

was always next to one of his woodstoves. Always in a place of prominence. It took me almost forty years to get that one little teal from Henry. Then I tell them the story of the other pair. R. Madison Mitchell had given this pair to his brother-in-law. I had known of them for some time. When I finally got to own the pair, word quickly reached Madison Mitchell. Mr. Mitchell had told me that they had come to him from Ed Gethers. Gethers was the owner of the junkyard in Havre de Grace. The pair had rested in the scrap pile, destined for a new life in some other form. But in Mr. Gethers' wisdom, he rescued them and brought them to Madison so that they might live on. I remember Mr. Mitchell being just a bit annoved that his brotherin-law would have let them leave his custody. "Well, Johnny, all I can say is that my brother-in-law must've been pretty darn hungry to sell you that pair."

Now I show Pat and my guests a pair of full-size high-necked cast iron Canada geese. The big geese weigh over 70 pounds each. They measure more than 22 inches in length with their erect necks nearly one foot in height. I have never seen another one nor has Pat or my guests. These big geese make the cast iron Holly geese seem diminutive in stature. The only story I can share about these is that I bought them from my dear friend Bob Hockaday, who found them in a house in Roland Park in Baltimore resting alongside a massive fireplace.

We look at my new friends' photos of the massive cast iron canvasbacks from Currituck. We compare the images to my pair. Yes, the same vintage, style, form, and surface. He remarks that it is rare to find a pair of these with their bills intact. Most known examples were resurrected from the bottom of the Currituck Sound. Weighing in at approximately 45 pounds each, it is no wonder that many were scuttled at the end of their life riding on a sinkbox. With their reared back necks, these massive ducks have always reminded me of those pictured in *The Illustrated*



London News of "Wild Duck Shooting on the Potomac" on December 14, 1850.

Although my guests don't collect the little cast iron decoys, they look at my collection of these and notice that they are the only things in my gatherings upon which I have placed a small sticker on each of their undersides. I have indicated on those stickers when and where I acquired them. I wonder as we pick up one, sit it down, and lift another, why these are the only things around me where I have actually made a notation of their source. Then it strikes me that they were made as ornaments, paperweights, or ashtrays. They led a very different life than that of a working decoy. Sure, they would have stories to tell, but not the stories of a sporting life on the waters of the Chesapeake region.


My new friends show me photos of their cast iron brant. They have examples from North Carolina, Long Island, and New Jersey. Each of their brant exhibits a different form, a different style, but all with the same function—to lure the elusive brant to within shotgun range of the lethal sinkboxes.

Then I tell another story. What is it about these old decoys and the stories associated with them? Over the years, I have heard those whom I don't consider to be serious collectors comment on how rare their decoys are, how much they paid for them, and the fact that what they have the very best of the best. Those are not the decoys or the stories that I care about. I became serious about this wonderful



hobby of ours nearly 40 years ago. I am sure that some guests who walk into my home wonder what is wrong with this man. Why would he want all of "this stuff" around him? I worry about those thoughts for a moment or two, then I move on and reflect on the great history associated with all of this stuff.

My new decoy friends left me that evening, and from all appearances they leave with only the album they carried in. My hope for them and for Patrick Vincenti is that they will retain and recall a few of the stories I shared. I looked at their business card as they pulled out of the driveway, it says "Collecting Iron Decoys." It doesn't say collecting the best, the rarest or the most expensive iron decoys. I believe my new decoy friends are genuine collectors. Each of my decoys has a story to tell with me as their translator. My most sincere desire is that by having others admire them and handle them, listen to where they came from and where they were used and how they spent their younger days, that they will live on another day to tell another tale and to be cherished by yet another collector.

Decoy Museum displays Maryland Federal Junior Duck Stamp Artwork

The Maryland Federal Junior Duck Stamp Program is the end result of an integrated science and art curriculum children receive in the state of Maryland. Students learn about the importance of wetlands and wetland conservation, while also learning artistic expression. As a result of all they learn, students produce a picture of a native North American species of duck, swan, or goose, displayed in its natural habitat.

The pieces of art are divided into four age groups from kindergarten to 12th grade. A panel of judges drawn from the art and science fields then selects the winners from each group. 26 winners are selected from each group: 16 honorable mention, 4 third place, 4 second place, and 4 first place. The four first place winners are then judged again to select the Best of Show. The student earning this award moves on to compete in the National Federal Junior Duck Stamp Contest, competing against winners from the other 49 states the District of Columbia, and some of the U.S. Territories.





All first, second and third place winning artwork goes on a state-wide tour. Prizes for the winners vary each year depending on donations and sponsorships. The Decoy Museum was very pleased to display this truly extraordinary art from August 6th through September 10th. 

Chesapeake Bay Gateway Network Holds Informational Seminar on the Captain John Smith Waterway Trail

n September the Decoy Museum hosted an informational seminar about the Captain John Smith National Waterway Trail. The National Park Service's Chesapeake Gateway Network conducted the seminar. The waterway trail was established by Congress in December of 2006. The National Park Service is visiting the various geographical locations along the trail. Whether a visitor travels by car along the system or travels by boat, the Park Service is investigating the type of experiences and information people should gain by their visit.

General topics such as the formation of the bay, Native American history, local history and environmental issues were discussed. The fact finding and information gathering will be an ongoing process. The trail will be established in phases and the guides will be developed according to the areas.

The museum was proud to host and to be a part of the Chesapeake Bay Gateway Network. We look forward to being a part of the planning process.




