
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While attending the Rappahanock spring waterfowl show a year and a half ago, I saw a man working his way through the crowd while carrying a large attractive wall-hanger fish. When I made inquiry, I found that the fish, a 42-inch gag-grouper, was made special order by Ray Whetzel for delivery at the show. The owner of the fish turned out to be world renowned waterfowl artist Art LeMay who graciously posed with Whetzel and fish for photos.

Living in the Washington, DC area, I was familiar with Ray Whetzel's fine carvings before I met him some 15 years ago. The occasion was a decoy and model boat show in Southern Maryland where I was asked to participate as "resident expert," identifying and valuing decoys. One of the show vendors was Whetzel, and I purchased a bird carving before the show opened. His table was almost bare by noontime. A friendship developed over the years as I acquired a few more of his carvings. He has also applied his talented hand in restoring to original likeness some of my antique Government worker, worked as Graphics Chief of the Executive Office Publication Branch at the US Executive Office Building in downtown Washington. He was charged with creating and producing graphics for various presidential reports, from President Richard Nixon through the senior George Bush. His graphic designs can be found on the cover and/or on the inside of various White House documents and publications as well as on awards, certificates, charts, etc. Whetzel's job included visits to the Oval Office where artistic and graphic needs were discussed, or to the Executive Office press room, or to the US Capitol where Whetzel would watch the President or a White House spokesman use his graphics and artistry for presentation support, including the presentation of the nation's budget. Whetzel was also present each year for the ceremonial presidential signing of the approved budget that usually took place in the oval office. I am sure, as history turned, these government publications are mostly shredded or are now pigeon holed someplace in the cellars of the Library



Drawing and painting, a natural gift, is something that Whetzel has done his entire life. It was a visit to a Salisbury, Maryland "duck" show in 1978 that piqued his interest in yet another art form, the carving and painting of waterfowl in graceful but realistic form. Materials, tools, and techniques were discussed and replayed in his mind on the way home. That week, tools and material were acquired and he made and painted his first wooden duck—he was hooked!


Whetzel signed up for carving classes given by Dan Williams as well as attending Don Briddell's carving seminars, both well known Maryland decorative carvers. Whetzel was able to easily shape the wood. It was his patience and artistic touch with burning tool and paint that created the delicate feathering detail, and as skills honed, his birds took on life-like form. Within the year he was competing at area shows which soon expanded to shows up and down the East Coast. He was carving for ribbons and in some cases cash prizes. He also sold his creations as a vendor at a variety of duck shows where competition birds were entered. Whetzel also became a member of several area carving clubs that met regularly to exchange knowledge, ideas and technique. He chuckles as he talks about the camaraderie and friendship of these clubs. He noted it was only natural as competition shows neared; members became tight-lipped about their entry creations.

Likeness and form study came from migrating waterfowl that visited the Potomac River a few short blocks from his Oxon Hill home, as well as from books, photographs, and shows. It was an old black duck decoy that he found along the shores of the Potomac that again piqued his interest, this time in old gunning decoys, birds he had seen over the years, but to which he had not paid much attention. Many members of his carving clubs collected old decoys. The found decoy in worn original paint was identified as

being made by Ben Schmidt of Detroit, MI. Whetzel, along with a few other carving members soon joined the newly established Potomac River Decoy Collectors Association (PDCA), a group that collected old decoys. However, their monthly competition tables included a contemporary category and was another venue to compete. It also offered a waterfowling knowledge exchange, tables full of old decoys for study, plus an opportunity to sell his carved creations. Gunning style decoys or "slicks" with fine paint proved popular with membership—not only his ducks, but shorebirds, songbirds and fish. Whetzel was asked and accommodated with a few restorations and paint touch-up. He was also acquiring old decoys and soon expanded his carvings with stylized antique birds, all plainly marked with his RW burned signature.

We all know what a portrait painter is. Some of us might even laugh about people who pay to have their dog or cat memorialized with a finely painted portrait. Whetzel does "favorite decoy" water color portraits that have proven to be very popular. Besides the collector, some of those portraits are done for sons or grandsons of the original carver; or an individual will want a decoy done that was a part of his father's or grandfather's gunning rig. It is not unusual, when visiting a decoy collector in our area, to see some of Whetzel's framed realistic decoy portraits hanging, overlooking a room full of decoys.

Whetzel has a vast collection of show ribbons collected over the years. Many of them are blue ribbons, some of them best in show. This past spring at the Ward Museum sponsored "World Competitions," featuring some of the nation's finest carvers; he won three ribbons, one of them a first place in the Antique Confidence category. Another bird, a flicker, won a Best in Show at an earlier "World Competition," and spent 6-months on display at the Ward Museum.



Several years ago, Whetzel was selected as Carver of the Year by the Rappahonock Ducks Unlimited Chapter, a group he has supported for many years. Two years ago, the US Government Patuxent Wildlife Research Center called on Whetzel to deliver one of his carvings to popular local NBC weatherman Bob Ryan to promote their forthcoming decoy and state stamp competition show. Ryan gave his forecasts with a Whetzel mallard duck front and center, with commentary about the Patuxent sponsored weekend show. Whetzel tells of the masses that visited the show and that many recognized the mallard duck as being the same as the one they saw on their television. Needless to say, it was a good show for Whetzel.

One unusual call came from the State of Maryland Governor's office. They wanted to purchase decoys as they had seen his work at the Patuxent show. Whetzel wrapped and bundled several of his carvings and drove to meet the purchaser. They were purchasing State of Maryland gifts from the Governor for visiting dignitaries. Whetzel chuckles as he recalls asking for Maryland sales tax and they were ill-prepared with tax exempt identification. He was also pleased that his carvings were chosen as state gifts, considering all of the fine Maryland carvers.

Longtime blue ribbon carver Bruce Eppard tells of meeting Whetzel at a Salisbury, Maryland show in the early 1980s. Not only did he like what Whetzel was producing, but he also lived in the same geographical location. "I sort



of adopted Whetzel as a mentor, whether he liked it or not" says Eppard. He also looked for Whetzel at the shows and as others were doing, he would bring birds for Whetzel to critique. "Some of these guys are brutal and will rip from the get-go" says Eppard, "but Whetzel was always supportive and encouraging and the criticism was always constructive." Whetzel lent his patterns and Eppard went to his house to use his band saw as well as discuss technique. "He has had a great influence on the designs and lines of my birds" says Eppard. "He would even lend me finished birds to take home and study." Eppard continued "when I started, Whetzel was considered a top area carver; he was very competitive and he was competing against some of the best carvers along the East Coast—I selected my mentor well!"

Eppard was not the only one seeking guidance and using Whetzel's equipment. Southern Maryland blue ribbon carver Mark Finisecy (see H&F Collectibles Mar/Apr 07) also credits Whetzel as mentor saying "he is a fine artisan and friend who is straight forward with his critiques. Finisecy continues "we are long-term friends who often discuss techniques, paint, and style, and then go head to head at area competition tables." Finisecy is the one that Whetzel has looked to over the years to critique his work.

When job retirement came, the creative juices switched to overdrive with more time to research, study and create. Whetzel is a prolific carver and his home contains a potpourri of his creations in different stages of coming to life. He is surrounded by waterfowl, fish and songbirds and there are easels containing drawings, many of them "favorite decoys." Some of his carvings and water colors are now done to order and there is a small group of the same people who look for Whetzel and purchase as he does the East Coast decoy and carving show circuit. One of the birds on the table is a forlorn Doug Jester merganser decoy stripped bare along time ago. It is awaiting "old paint" application to original likeness from gifted hands. When done, the merganser will never ride tidal waters again, but will rest on the collector's shelf. It will have new life, just like his carving creations. It is a talent along with hard work and study that has brought Whetzel a lifetime of satisfaction!

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# J. Evans McKinney Old Decoy Contest

#### 2009 COMPETITION

The 7th Annual J. Evans McKinney Old Decoy Contest to be held in conjunction with the 2009 Havre de Grace Decoy & Wildlife Art Festival will be held Saturday, May 2nd at the Middle School Gym. Entries will be accepted at the stage area from 10:00 a.m. until judging at noon. Joe Engers, editor & publisher of Decoy Magazine will head up a three-member judge's panel. Participants must make a best faith effort to assure that all decoy entries were made prior to 1950. Each decoy will be limited to one category competition only. Matched pairs entered in other than a Matched Pair category will be considered as one entry. There is a competition ban, regardless of category, on last year's winning birds. Competition decoys will be kept in a highly visible roped-off secure area and will not be handled by the public. At approximately 1:00p.m., the public will be invited to review the roped off and secured tables once the judges have made their selections. A blue ribbon will be awarded for each of the following ten category winners. The three-judge panel will also select a best in show winner. Winners will be requested to display their decoys and ribbons at the Havre de Grace Decoy Museum for a three month period.

- 1.Best Upper Bay Puddle Duck
- 2.Best Standley Evans Decoy
- 3.Best Paul Gibson Decoy
- 4.Best J. Evans McKinney Decoy (age requirement waived)
- 5.Best Wooden Wing Duck

- 6.Best Mid-Bay or Eastern Shore Black Duck
- 7.Best Virginia Brant
- 8.Best Coastal Jersey, Delaware River Mallard
- 9.Best Canvasback, any area
- 10.Best Unknown

There will be no restrictions as to those who can participate or number of categories entered; however participants are restricted to no more than three birds per category. Competition issues will be resolved at the sole discretion of the competition chairman and/or competition chief judge. #### A Day in the Life of a Collector



We all have a good day from time to time or as some say "even a blind squirrel finds an occasional nut." I had one of those good days several years back. I can

attribute it to so many things in life: luck, happenstance, being at the right place at the right time or perhaps the proper alignment of the stars, the moon and planets. This was one of those days.

In April of 2003, I received a tip from a local antique dealer that a gentleman had called. He had some old decoys and some old guns to sell. I looked at the note sitting on my desk all day long. And at 5 minutes to 5 o'clock, I made the phone call introducing myself after the third ring to the gentleman. "Yes, I have some old decoys, my father got them from the Bowley's Quarters Gunning Club, they were under the ladies room in the cellar." "Do you have any old guns?" He says, "Yes, I have an 8-gauge English breech loader that came from Bowley's Quarters Gunning Club. I got my grandfather's Remington Model 11 with an extended tube." "When can I come to see them?" I ask. He gives me directions and I'm on the road. It is now 8:11 and I am returning from Middle River with 90 decoys in the back of my Suburban having written two checks to cover my purchases. Three

wonderful early fish float bobbers sit on the front seat next to me. The pièce de résistance is one decoy, a bluebill drake that is by the same maker as the decoy sticking up in front of two men photographed at Grace's Quarter. I would say that out of the approximately 90 decoys there are 20 to 30 Holly's, maybe 1 or 2 early McGaw's, some by Bailey Moltz from Havre de Grace - all redhead drakes, a big bold high head canvasback Holly drake, a big horse head Jim Currier canvasback drake, and of course, the wonderful little bluebill. Some early, early branded decoys, one with the brand J. Breese (Breese was the onetime owner of the Oakington estate) on its underside, others with just initials. A great visit, a great pile of stuff. I'll maybe be able to wash about 6 of them tonight. and a new term was introduced to me for storytelling. Low ceiling dirt floored cellar smelling of cat and dog, burned coal and the earthen floor, banging my head on the beams, cobwebs over every thing and 86 of the decoys way back in the furnace room, I could only look at them with a flashlight. I made my offer and bought them that way. Once I got them carried outside in the daylight they didn't look nearly as good as they did with the flashlight. I said to the gentleman "These look a lot worse out here in this light than they did with a flashlight." He replied "Don't tell me that John Sullivan, I know

you know what you're doing, you're what my father called a "smarter." I said, "A 'smarter,' what's that mean?" He said, "You've never heard that term? There's a new one for you." I said, "Well, what is a smarter?" He said, "You're smarter than I am when it comes to these decoys. You'll do fine." I think he was right, I did do fine. But the biggest problem is I am the worst kind of collector, a collector who hates to part with anything. The fish bobbers went into baskets with dozens of others that came from the same area; the decoys are displayed in my boats, my baskets and on my shelves. Am I smarter? I doubt it, but I am richer. Yes, I am richer from the experience and the stories that these old wooden decoys can tell.

I consider myself extremely fortunate to have come upon that rig from the historic Bowley's Quarters Gunning club, a club that dates back to the mid-1800s. Approximately six months after I cleaned out that cellar a tropical storm by the name of Isabel finished the job, leaving in her wake extensive damage to the cellar, and washing away anything the foundation and I might have mistakenly left behind.

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# Have You Got What it Takes to be a Volunteer?



Volunteers are a great asset to any organization. We would love to have you come aboard.


