Today vs. Yesterday

WHERE HAS THE HISTORY OF WATERFOWLING GONE?

I became a waterfowler late in my life. I wasn't raised in a hunting household nor did I start at a young age. I don't have stories about hunting with my father and my grandfather, while recalling duck blind stories of yester year. I don't have memories of hunting over a set of Mitchell block's or of the good ole days of waterfowling.

As I progressed through my years of waterfowling, I learned quickly of the need for decoys. I quickly bought my first dozen, followed shortly thereafter with many more. The need grew for a an entire rig of whatever bird I was hunting...be it ducks or geese. Then came the need for spinning decoys, battery and motor driven spinning wing decoys that resemble a landing duck into my spread...something I just couldn't live without.

Then, as my passion grew, so did my choice in decoys. I needed the latest and greatest, the best most life like decoy out there. Flocked head geese, bobbing feeder's, motion makers for the water and just about every big or little thing that could possibly help me bring in the birds.

But then, a few years in, my wife happened to stop by the Havre de Grace Decoy Museum one day. It just so happened to be that year's Duck Fair. During the live auction, I bought my first handcarved decoy, an antiqued Bryant Blue Bill. With that purchase, my life was about to change. A few years later, my collection has grown to include a Mitchell Black duck that my wife bought me for Christmas which is proudly displayed.

Some years later, I happened to stop in Captain Bob Jobes' shop. I introduced



myself and quickly became friends with him and his family. While talking with him, over the sound of him sanding decoys, I became entrenched into the life of the carver. A story that has volumes of names which make up the entire life of the decoy.

While hunting over my lifelike plastic birds, I quickly realized that there is no life behind them. There are no names attached to each, no heritage and no history. There is nothing to tell other then the purchase and the store in which they were found. Each is nearly perfect, exactly the same without imperfections. They are merely tools, tools of the hunt.

Yes, very true to all you young hunters reading this, they are much more durable, forgiving and lighter for hunters to carry. However, there is no history behind them. As the new age of waterfowling, the heritage behind waterfowling has been forgotten with the advent of the molded plastic decoys.

Now I have my stories and memories that bring back the richness with waterfowling. I have memories of sitting in Captain Bob Jobes shop while he reminisces about Mr. Madison and Jimmy Pierce. I have memories of my son

In His Own Words ...

s I was growing up in York County, Pennsylvania, upland hunting was a tradition in my family. Weekends were spent at field tri-

als or hunting. With the continual reduction of farmland so went the habitat for the birds. I saw waterfowl hunting to be an obvious replacement. Time was now spent hunting on the Susquehanna River or leases in Maryland.

In 1980 I thought it would be cheaper and more authentic to make my own decoys than it would be to hunt over plastic. My first attempts were big, square, flat, and very, very ugly. From the start I went through many changes. Using old decoys I tried to imitate them with very little success. I then purchased some patterns that were of life-sized birds. These patterns gave me a feel for the duck but not something that would be useful as a decoy. After many changes I developed patterns that became my own oversized My first birds were made from one inch pine boards glued together.

heads and bodies. By enlarging the bodies the decoys rode the water better, they didn't pitch and bob the way a plastic decoy would.

Just as my carving went through changes so did my painting and the materials I was using. My first birds were made from one inch pine boards glued together. Quickly I found other types of material. I used two inch sugar pine that was

hollowed and laminated together. A few cork birds were made from black refrigeration cork. Eventually I came upon a better product, tan cork and white cedar from Maine.

Though hunters have found my decoys to be very successful, I am always looking for ways to improve. Over the years I have appreciated the advice and friendship from my fellow carvers.

Through decoy making I have had the opportunity to travel to a variety of decoy shows. I have competed and displayed my decoys at the Havre de Grace Decoy and Wildlife Art Festival since 1982. I enjoy demonstrating at the shows because it gives me the opportunity to share our craft and encourage others, especially children, to try carving decoys on their own.

or the mid-Atlantic decoy collector, the Havre de Grace show, sponsored by and for the benefit of the Havre de Grace Decoy Museum, signals the wind-down of the spring decoy shows. May 1-3, decoy enthusiasts converged on Havre de Grace, the self proclaimed "Decoy Capital of the World," to celebrate their annual Decoy Festival. This year's Honorary Chairman was veteran carver Bill Veasey of Elkton, Maryland. He is known primarily as a quality decorative carver and carving technique teacher, who has also served on the Board of Directors of the Havre de Grace Decoy Museum and the Easton Waterfowl Festival. Many of us enjoyed stopping by his display in the middle school to talk

ducks and view his spectacular carvings. One piece that caught everyone's attention was a wood duck family in natural habitat. Besides Veasey, the middle school was packed with decoy and decoy art vendors, with a good proportion of the decoy vendors carrying old birds. The middle school was also the venue for the J. Evans McKinney Old Decoy Contest. Besides decoy vendors and the antique decoy competition, the three-day show also included carving as well as contemporary gunning rig decoy competitions.

Waterfowler Days, sponsored by Delta Waterfowl, filled the contiguous Havre de Grace Activity Center with waterfowl products, duck boats, outfitters, guides etc. This group provided seminars and demonstra-

tions on everything from goose calling to retriever handling; there was even a seminar on wood duck box building. The big plus of Delta's Waterfowler Days is that it attracted additional "duck" people, many who took the time to browse and buy from the vendors in the nearby middle school building.

In the middle school, decoy vendor/ historian John Sullivan had a spectacular display of upper Chesapeake Bay decoys along with photo backdrop that included many original paint decoys by many different carvers out of the famed Joel Pusey rig. There was also a good variety of wing ducks as well as many Charles Nelson Barnard hi-head canvasbacks. A Jim Holly goose was also displayed along with an early Madison Mitchell swan acting as the confidence bird. Sullivan's vendor table also had many fine examples of early upper bay decoys. We all enjoyed visiting with decoy historian Henry Fleckenstein who was a show attendee Friday evening. Chris Worch and Marshall Purner had four tables between them full of old birds. PDCA Treasurer Worch also collected dues from delinquent members and signed on two new members. Most vendors, some with a qualification of "considering economic conditions," were pleased with the show. Besides decoys, The Potomac Decoy Collectors Association table had photos and printed matter describing early gunning on the River. One show visitor, a mid-west collector who stopped by our table to examine a hi-head Jim Currier

canvasback from a Potomac gunning rig, explained that when his wife died several years ago, she wanted a rose on her tombstone. He went on to explain that while he was having the tombstone rose carved, he had a Currier canvasback decoy carved for his part of the headstone. He was not a Currier collector; he just liked the form of

the Chesapeake Bay canvasbacks, especially those made by Currier. He did find a Currier decoy to take home with him. Jon Frank was on hand providing decoy appraisals as well as displaying decoys for his forthcoming October auction. Joe Engers' table was stocked with *Decoy Magazine* issues that featured a wide vari-

ety of upper Chesapeake Bay carvers, the current issue featuring a cover story on Havre de Grace carver Paul Gibson.

Jim & Clo Trimble worked again this year as festival volunteers, taking responsibility and accepting decoys for the J. Evans McKinney Old Decoy Contest. Chad Tragakis, as in years past, worked as "duck handler" with over 80 decoys entered in this 10-category contest. Decoy judge selection is on a yearly rotation basis with collectors Eddie Deane, Nate Heess, and Burt Campbell selected to serve this year. Tragakis, Worch and Jeff Pelayo served as backup judges when judges disqualified because of decoy entry. John Sullivan won the Wooden Wing Duck category with an original paint Jim Holly bluebill in fine mellow paint. Sullivan struck again winning the Canvasback category with a fine pair of regal hi-head birds made by Charles Nelson Barnard. This pair also won Best in Show. The Upper Bay Puddle Duck category was won by Nate Heess with a unique pinch-breast mallard in fine original paint made by Jim Holly. The Standley Evans category saw many entries of fine gunning birds, but it was a mini pair of canvasbacks entered by Bill Cordrey that won the blue ribbon. Cordrey also won the Coastal Jersey/Delaware River Mallard category with a fine early carving by Bob White. The Paul Gibson category was won by Eddie Dean with original paint pintails, circa 1950s. This pair was also featured in Decoy Magazine's current issue cover story on Paul Gibson. A mini can hen owned by Randy Futty won the Evans McKinney category. The Mid-Bay/Eastern Shore Black Duck category was won by Dick Larrimore

with a fine original paint black duck with raised primaries made by his grandfather Walter Larrimore of Annapolis, Maryland. Jim Trimble, with a fine original paint hollow Ira Hudson brant, won the Virginia Brant category. The Unknown category was won by Henry Krote with a finely carved diminutive buffelhead in swimming position. Some of these birds that have surfaced over the years have carried a Schick brand, but the maker has remained elusive. This little decoy made a strong run for Best in Show. Category winning decoys along with their ribbons will be displayed at the museum for the next several months. This old decoy competition attracted 31 collectors who entered 81 decoys.

Saturday's late day auction had a good offering. The top-dollar lot was a pair of

later Charles Joiner pintails, s&d, that hammered for \$1,250. For the second year in a row, there was a sixty some odd set of Tit-bird Bauer's matched pair minis, and they were second top-dollar lot when they hammered for \$800. There were numerous old gunners that sold in the several hundred dollar price range as did the original paint Mitchell and Bryan decoys. The auction was well organized. The auctioneer moved along at about one item per minute, and checkout was a breeze. All prices quoted are before 10% buyer's premium. Our hats off to Ed Watts, Pat Vincenti and a legion of others at the Havre de Grace Decoy Museum for providing another fun packed weekend for our decoy collecting community.

The Havre de Grace Decoy Museum opened its new traveling exhibit at the Hampton History Museum in Hampton, Virginia on February 27, 2009. The select opening was attended by over 100 museum patrons and has proven to be very popular.

The City of Hampton, Virginia is located at the end of the bay from Havre de Grace, just 18 miles from the Chesapeake capes. Hampton was founded in 1610 and is the oldest permanent English-speaking community in North America. For nearly four centuries, Hampton has played an active role in the development of our nation in times of war and peace. Of course, a community with such a rich heritage would have a museum and the City of Hampton sponsors the Hampton History Museum. Located in downtown Hampton, this museum presents 400 years of Hampton history featuring artifacts about Blackbeard, the Civil War, the seafood industry, and NASA.

Hampton's location in the lower Chesapeake Bay connects it with the great migration of waterfowl to the Chesapeake. Thousands of canvasbacks, Widgeons, Canada geese, and swans passed through the Hampton Roads en route from the Susquehanna Flats to the North Carolina sounds. Duck blinds dotted the Back River marshes and Hampton Roads shoreline as large rafts of canvasbacks once congregated during the winter months. Hampton's Old Point Comfort Resort featured hunting excursions to its 10,000 acre preserve on the Chickahominy River. Gunners were also offered special hunting excursions from Old Point Comfort to Cobb's Station on the Eastern Shore and Knott's Island on Back Bay. President Grover Cleveland visited Hampton's Old Point Comfort Resort to enjoy the region's duck hunting and to feast upon canvasback prepared in the style of the famous hotelier and restauranteur, John Chamberlin.

Oddly, Hampton never developed a decoy industry like other Chesapeake Bay communities. Nevertheless, the Hampton Roads community has a major interest in the decoys as an American art form. Accordingly, when the Havre de Grace Decoy Museum needed to begin its traveling exhibit program, the Hampton History Museum agreed to be the first host for this display.

The 'Art of the Decoy' exhibition focuses on Chesapeake Bay decoys. The exhibit tells the story about how decoys originated with man's effort to lure waterfowl into range. Whether hunting with a net or gunning with a shotgun, decoys were a simple tool-replications of waterfowl-designed to enhance a hunter's chances; as important as his boat, blind, and firearm.

The exhibit enables patrons to reflect upon how man made his decoys to appear alive from afar. The more a working decoy resembled nature, the more birds the hunter took home.

The waterfowl decoy is now a treasured form of folk art. Often highly sought after as collectibles, many are quite valuable. The decoys selected for the 'Art of the Decoy' traveling exhibit offer a good review of the various decoys replicated by some of the Chesapeake Bay's most outstanding carvers. Canvasbacks by Sam Barnes and Bob McGraw, Whistling Swan

by R. Madison Mitchell, Black-bellied Plover by Dave 'Umbrella' Watson, and flying canvasbacks by Charlie 'Speed' Joiner are just a few of the decoys featured within the exhibit. Considered together, these birds symbolize technology's impact on the art, environmental, social, and economic lifestyles.

'Art of the Decoy' places decoys within their historical context through the past two centuries-from a bayman's working tool, used for both market and sports hunting, to the birth of these 'floating sculpture' as American folk art. Indeed, the exhibit will share with more audiences how man has taken simple materials such as wood and captured the bird spirit in a man-made image. Decoys appeal to us today, not only as hunting devices, but also because their makers satisfied a need for expression and individuality. Through a decoy's carving and painting a treasured folk art was born.

The Havre de Grace Decoy Museum plans to offer this exhibit to museums throughout the nation in an effort to broaden Museum awareness and a greater national appreciation for America's decoy making traditions.

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

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
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THANKYOU TO THE 2009 FESTIVAL VOLUNTEERS

How I got started BUT NOT my first decoy.



I have written and talked about my very first decoy, yes the one given to me by my maternal grandparents to save my parents' decoys that rested on the hearth of the living

room fireplace. But I have never mentioned the miniature decoys that I always admired and coveted. Sitting on the builtin bookcase in my family's living room were a pair of miniature canvasback decoys. My father purchased them from R. Madison Mitchell in the 1940's. The pair were mounted on well sculpted burl walnut bases with green patterned desk blotter paper glued to each base's underside. The circa 1940 Mitchell paint was crisp, clear and bright and applied with all the skills of the master carver. Although I studied them literally hundreds of times as a youngster, they remained on the same shelf in practically the exact same location for over 30 years. To say that I coveted them as a young boy is no exaggeration. I wanted those little decoys to be on my shelves in the same exact way that I wanted the Case pocket knife that my dear Aunt Lauretta kept on her bedroom dresser, the 1941 Harford County Hunting license that stood erect on her

telephone desk in the big country kitchen, and the 410 gauge shotgun that leaned in her living room closet. My aunt and uncle also had a single miniature of the same time

period and also carved by Mr. Mitchell. It was a canvasback drake mounted on a base like my parents' pair. I remember wondering why they only had a single, why its base was cherry and not walnut and why the blotter on the base of theirs was blue and not green. It sat in a place of honor on the sideboard in their dining room. I knew better than to ever express too much interest in it for fear that I would ruin the chance of it ever coming my way. The loss of loved ones, in particular a parent, is traumatic at any age, but I lost my father shortly after my seventeenth birthday. Those miniature decoys were in the living room

where my

father's viewing was held just as they had been at the time of my grandfather's viewing. They were a part of the family for decades, watching both happy moments and sad moments. They were there when we gathered around the fireplace during the great blizzard of 1958. That massive snow storm left us without electricity for 10 days. My mother gave me those little birds when my wife and I bought Bon Air in 1976. They were joined in 1983 by the single miniature canvasback drake that I

inherited from my dear Aunt at her pass-

ing. Those miniatures were joined over the years by many others, becoming part of an ever growing number of miniatures.

I have miniatures from the Upper Chesapeake region as well as down the Bay. They are a fascinating part of the great waterfowling history of the Chesapeake Bay. I have always felt that they were created for a variety of reasons but most importantly they typically exhibit the best carving skills of the maker and the best painting that their maker was capable of executing. They are some of the earliest decorative decoy carvings ever made. When carved, the maker knew that his miniatures were to be placed on a mantle piece, on a shelf or in some other place of honor. Knowing that not just the live fowl and the hunter would be looking at them, he most certainly took extra care and extra time in carving and painting them. If you are a new collector or a long time collector, miniatures are still available, there are contemporary carvers still creating these delightful diminutive birds and historic ones can still be found in excellent condition. Consider enhancing your old or new decoy collection with some of these masterpieces in miniature.


Georgie and I talking with Pat Vincenti and Bill Collins while they sat and painted ducks. In fact, that memory is burned deeply in my mind. As if I rose out of my body for a second, I saw that picture from behind me. I saw the photograph of us four. Pat on the right in front of me, painting a golden eye while laughing at some really bad jokes and Bill painting the base coat. Bill not saying much over the sound of oldies playing on the radio and Georgie sitting on the floor next to me on the floor in the foreground.

No longer with these new fangled decoys are there the memories of the maker. Of paint covered Khaki trousers and white T-shirts, the odor of painted bird drying on the racks and saw dust and draw knives. There isn't the story of how the lathe changed carving. The nexus between these two tools of waterfowling has drifted away.

But now, at 43 years old, I have those memories that I recall each and every time I venture out to the Flats. I remember sitting in Bob's shop with his crab traps stacked outside. I remember talking with Pat with his pictures displayed neatly beside him. I can recount the stories that I have been told about Mr. Mitchell and the carvers that have passed. I count the carvers of today as my friends, who have carved their names into my son's memory. He now, at 13 years old, has memories of waterfowling. He has the stories that I do not.

As the waterfowlers of today, we must remember that our passion has a past. A rich deep heritage that transcends a few days or even a few years ago. A history that has formed what we prize each fall and winter. And the key to remembering that history can be found in seeing the brush strokes on hand carved and hand painted decoys. Of knowing who carved these birds of knowing them personally. These men have stories to tell, stories of today versus the yesterday of waterfowling and the art of the decoy.

So, in closing, my waterfowling life is full now because I know where we came from and the heritage behind it all. All thanks to the Havre de Grace Decoy Carvers. ■




