

HAVRE DE GRACE WHAT SING SI

With the turning of the calendar to the first full weekend in May, the East Coast decoy collector usually heads to the small waterfront community of Havre de Grace, Maryland located at the top of the Chesapeake Bay. Havre de Grace is the self proclaimed "Decoy Capital of the World," and the collector is going there to buy, sell, display, compete or just enjoy.

his festival is the primary fund raiser for the Havre de Grace Decoy Museum. With \$4.25 plus gas prices (economy) and the show falling on a Mother's Day weekend, attendance and vendor participation for the May 6-8 show was down from year past. "First Friday" celebrations saw the downtown streets fill Friday evening with live performers, street musicians, and War of 1812 re-enactors. Stores stayed open late, all welcoming visitors to their community. *Canvasback* magazine's festival issue, which serves as a roadmap to this three-day event,

noted the 30th anniversary milestone and also noted that later this year, the Museum will celebrate its 25th anniversary. Upstate New York decoy carver Tom Humberstone served as this year's Honorary Show Chairman. Humberstone, a retired firefighter and avid waterfowler, who has served as the New York State Council Chairman for Ducks Unlimited, carves in his St. Lawrence River regional style.

Besides decoy vendors and an antique decoy competition, the three-day show, also included carving as well as contemporary



gunning rig decoy competitions. The Upper Chesapeake Chapter of Delta Waterfowl was involved again this year in the Outdoor Hunting portion of the show that was held in and around the Activity Center. 15-year old archer/trick shooter Chris Hurt of Delta Pennsylvania (Google him) wowed the crowd by shooting with his long bow and carbon arrows against a white backdrop. His assistant Autumn Dawson, from a 30-foot range, threw targets seven to 10 feet into the air. Hurt nailed the targets in the following order: a 12-inch Styrofoam disc, a sporting clay, a ping pong ball, an aspirin tablet and then a florescent painted bb. Skill shots were from behind the back, lying on the ground and/or shooting with his foot. He also hit targets ricocheting off of an old metal lamp.

The Havre de Grace Middle School was the venue for the decoy vendors as well as for the J. Evans McKinney Old Decoy Contest. This year saw fewer old decoy vendors than we have seen in past years. Pennsylvania Vendor Nate Heess provided an impressive display of original paint early upper Chesapeake Bay geese from his collection with chronological history. Canada geese decoys by early makers are rare to this region as geese

flight patterns did not change until the establishment of the Eastern Shore broiler industry during the early first quarter of last century. Farmers soon converted their fields to corn, and the corn attracted the geese. Heess received a lot of commentary as it gave the collector a chance to compare bigger bird carving styles. The display included early geese by Sam Barnes (1857-1926) and Jim Holly (1855-1935) among others. The Potomac Decoy Collectors Association was a festival sponsor and their table provided information about this collector's group. Jon Frank was on hand providing decoy appraisals as well as displaying decoys for his forthcoming October auction. Joe Engers' table was stocked with Decoy Magazine issues that featured a wide variety of upper Chesapeake Bay carvers. Waterfowl historian John Sullivan's table was loaded with fine old Chesapeake Bay birds and he was receiving well wishes from the collecting crowd on his recent appointment as Director of Operations for the Museum. Jeannie Vincenti "manned" the Vincenti's tables of contemporary as well as old decoys while husband Pat, the Museum's President, greeted visitors and opined for many on the identification of their decoys. Doctors Kramer, Kramer and Kramer (Long-time vendor



Dr. Mort Kramer and his two adult children Doctors Andrew and Rachel Kramer) had a table full of Charles Bryan, Oliver Lawson, Charles Joiner and Mark McNair birds that attracted a lot of attention. The senior Kramer is a longtime supporter of the Museum and he has donated decoys for several displays, the most visible being the Ward Bros. and Factory Decoy displays.

Jim & Clo Trimble worked again this year as festival volunteers, taking responsibility and accepting decoys for the 10-category J. Evans McKinney Old Decoy Contest. Chad Tragakis, Griff Evans and Tom East worked as "duck handlers." Decoy judge selection is on a yearly rotation basis with collectors Bill Cordrey, Will Freng and Jeff Fitzhugh selected to serve. Pat Vincenti won the Wally Algard category with a pair of regal canvasbacks in mellow original paint. Vincenti also won the Cecil County Iron Weight category with a "racy" John Graham can hen in fine paint. John Sullivan won the Lum Fletcher category with an original paint hi-head canvasback with fine head/bill carving. A "Daddy" Holly redhead owned by Sullivan won the Harford County Iron Weight category. Sullivan struck again with his original paint John Glen hi-neck canvasback with strong feather patterns that won the Rock Hall Diving

Duck category. An original paint Lloyd Sterling pintail in fine patina and fine artistic paint patterns won the Maryland Eastern Shore category and the Best in Show ribbon for Mort Kramer. The Ward Bros. category was won by Jon Frank with an original paint turned-head goose with finely painted feather patterns. Kramer's Ward Bros. entry of a fine pintail with wonderful paint patterns was a crowd favorite, but did not get the judges nod. An early tack-eyed round-bodied original paint canvasback won first honors for Jim Trimble in the Ira Hudson Diving Duck category. Henry Krotee won the Unknown category with a "ménage à trois" of fine little buffleheads. We all had a good chuckle when Tom East's bluebill entry into the Unknown category was identified by Chris Worch as being made by lower Potomac River carver Charles Moore and was thus disqualified. Category winning

decoys along with their ribbons will be displayed at the Museum for the next several months. 69 birds from 18 collectors were entered this year. These numbers are down from year past.

This writer was unable to attend Saturday's late day auction. Our hats off to Scott Krieger, Festival Chairman, Margaret Jones, Special Event Coordinator and the rest of the staff and a legion of volunteers for providing another fun packed weekend for our decoy collecting community.





he Festival Committee faced some challenges in 2011. Entering the year, the economy was still sputtering and other shows around the country were demonstrating significant attendance and vendor declines. People faced with uncertainty, unemployment or fear thereof and higher food and energy costs were showing reluctance to spend on nonessentials. At the same time, the Festival faced significantly higher rental fees for our key venues. So we made the difficult decision to raise both ticket and exhibitor prices, which hadn't been raised for a number of years, but now, had to be done at the worst possible time. The calendar also presented a dilemma. With Easter falling much later than usual, a number of other decoy shows chose to re-arrange their show schedules to avoid conflicts with Easter and Mother's Day. Despite the less than ideal situation of holding the Festival on Mother's Day weekend, the Festival


Committee chose to hold it on the traditional first full weekend of May to avoid competing for vendors and visitors with the World and Chicago shows scheduled to be held on the prior weekend.


We are pleased to report that despite these obstacles, the Festival's earnings appear to have increased percentage wise by double digits over the prior year. While admission income remained flat, sponsorship support almost doubled, exhibitor revenue increased and the committee was able to hold the line on expenses. Owing in large part to the Madison Mitchell theme, and a lot of hustle to sell tickets, we also had an excellent spring raffle. So thanks to everyone's hard work and support, this year's Festival has to be considered a financial success for the Museum, which benefits from all of the net proceeds. But while this is certainly important, the Festival is about more than just revenue generation.

The Festival Committee wants to express its appreciation for all the hard work and energy that all the volunteers gave. The Decoy & Wildlife Art Festival is the largest fundraiser for the Museum. It was started by volunteers and the volunteers are what make it a success. We encourage everyone to become a part of the Festival. Make room for a few hours to help next year and keep the Museum operating at the standards that make it one of the best museums around.





REMEMBERING

GOVERNOR-COMPTROLLER-MAYOR WILLIAM DONALD SCHAEFER

November 2, 1921 — April 18, 2011

On April 18, 2011, at the age of 89, William Donald Schaefer passed away following hospitalization for pneumonia. Schaefer was born and raised in Baltimore and other than his years in the United States Army during WWII, he spent his entire life in Maryland.

was honored to have met Mayor Schaefer during my years working for Maryland. He treated me as he did all who he met, with respect, dignity and interest. He always called me "young man" and would greet me saying: "Tell me something, young man."

William Donald Schaefer served the citizens of Maryland in a variety of rolls in both local and state positions. He entered public life in 1955 as a member of the

Baltimore City Council.

He was a councilman from 1955-1971, serving as President of the City Council from 1967-1971. In 1971 he was elected Mayor of Baltimore City and continued in that position until 1987. He was elected Governor of Maryland in 1986 and sworn into office on January 21, 1987. He was elected to a second term and continued in office until January 18, 1995.

After the death of his longtime friend, Louis L. Goldstein, Schaefer ran for Comptroller of Maryland and was elected by a substantial margin.

The former Governor served as State Comptroller from January 20, 1999 to January 17, 2007.

With the passing of Schaefer the citizens of Maryland lost a true statesman. But for the Havre de Grace Decoy Museum the loss was much greater. William Donald Schaefer was an admirer of the wooden fowl, Havre de Grace's legacy in carved and painted wood. Schaefer was a personal friend of and admirer of R. Madison Mitchell. He respected Mr. Mitchell and treasured Mr. Mitchell's decoys and our Museum. He was a frequent visitor to the Museum, a friend of the Museum and an active participant

in the R. Madison Mitchell Endowment Trust. William Donald Schaefer truly loved the city of Havre de Grace. It is hard to imagine this Museum without his vision and perseverance. As you remember this great statesman be thankful that he took notice of what this waterfront town once was and that he had the sense of history and image of the future to advance the mission of our great Museum.

Frederick Joseph Hatem, M.D.,

of Havre de Grace, Maryland, passed away on June 6, 2011. He was 84. He was born in Havre de Grace, MD, to the late Joseph T. Hatem and Nasma Joseph Hatem. He was the devoted husband of 58 years to Ariana Frances Hatem, loving father of Frederick Joseph Hatem, Jr., and his wife Carol of Bel Air, MD; Michael Hatem of Havre de Grace, MD; Stephen F. Hatem, M.D., and. his wife Amy of Cleveland Heights, Ohio; Mary Beth Hatem of Takoma Park, MD; Christine L. Hatem, and her husband Thomas Jordan, M.D., of Bel Air, MD; and the late Joanne M. Hatem, M.D. He was the adored grandfather of Gregory F. Hatem, David J. Hatem, Aaron T. Jordan, Ariana Y. Jordan, and Sarah Anne Hatem. He was the brother of Rose Mary Hatem Bonsack, M.D., of Aberdeen, MD, and the late Thomas J. Hatem.

Dr. Hatem first established his medical practice as a family physician in 1952 with the opening of an office in Aberdeen. Within a few years obstetrics had become a major part of his practice. Dr. Hatem chose to limit his practice to that specialty and moved his office to Havre de Grace, where he partnered with Dr. Richard Norment. During the course of his career, Dr. Hatem delivered over 10,000 babies.

Upon establishing his office in Harford County, Dr. Hatem immediately became involved in the Harford County medical community. In 1955 he was elected president of the Harford County Medical Society and in 1956 he began what would be the first of eight terms as president and Chief of Medical Staff at Harford Memorial Hospital. He was also active at the state level, serving as chair of the policy and planning committee of Med-Chi, Maryland State Medical Society. He also served as chair of the independent Maryland Medical Political Action Committee. He was honored to have been elected to membership in the Rush Medical

Club at the University of Maryland School of Medicine, and was further honored when his son, Stephen F. Hatem, M.D., was also elected to membership.

In 1988 Dr. Hatem served a term on the Harford County Council and was active in the community in numerous areas. Including the Boy Scout Troop 966 and as a coach for Havre de Grace Little League baseball. He served on numerous nonprofit boards throughout Harford County.

He served in the U. S. Army during World War II, and was a member of the American Legion Post 47 and VFW Post 8126 in Havre de Grace. He was also a member of the Church of St. Patrick and the Knight of Columbus. In his limited spare time, Dr. Hatem enjoyed golfing and as a charter member of Swan Creek Country Club, he often enjoyed recounting his tales of his hole-in-one. He was a life member of the Havre de Grace Decoy Museum.



A Weighty Collection



Why do we collect decoys? I have pondered this question and attempted to answer it many times. We all must make the decision ourselves. But my collecting goes


beyond just the wooden fowl; it encompasses every aspect associated with the waterfowling story. Many years ago, I became determined to gather about me all the accoutrements connected to this history. One element of this history from the Upper Chesapeake is the anchor weights used to secure the decoys around a sinkbox or bushwhack boat. Thousands of these cast iron weights were fabricated

across the Susquehanna

County at the iron foundry of the Whittaker Family. Many variations in style were made, from the most typical pyramid form to a cone shape and some mushroom forms. I had purchased many decoys in the late 1960s with their anchors still attached to their string lines and tied to a ring and staple or in more infrequently to the original leather strap nailed to the underside of the decoy's breast. If the decoy's string line was still secure, I would leave the rigged decoy's anchor attached and display the old bird just as it would have been stored after the gunning season. I was quite successful in accumulating many iron anchors, and the collection began to increase exponentially. I scoured my favorite antique shops and

flea markets in search of not just decoys but their anchors as well.

Over 25 years ago Captain Bob Jobes of Havre de Grace introduced me to Bill Lawder. The Lawder family's grocery store was located on South Stokes Street in Havre de Grace. The store has served residents of Havre de Grace at least since the 1920s. Bill invited me to the storage room located behind the store. For a number of years, the storage room had been used for a goose and duck picking operation. Above the storeroom was the loft, where the once extensive Lawder family decoy rig had at one time been stored. There rested the remnants of that rig. All that remained were dozens of the cast iron decoy anchor weights. I negotiated a price for the group, loaded them, and headed home with them.

They rested alongside others, on the shelves reserved exclusively for the weight collection and their numbers continued to grow. I kept a diminutive leather journal on the shelf adjacent to the weights and maintained an accurate count of those displayed there. The gang of weights increased significantly during my visits with John M. M. Pusey. The cast iron anchors were everywhere in the vast Pusey warehouse. There were 5 gallon buckets filled with them, wooden shell boxes packed with them, some were scattered on the warehouse floor and some were neatly stacked around the ledge of the buildings foundation. Wherever they were located they all came home to my shelves.

One particular incident which I have been reminded of many times over the years relates to a visit to my home by decoy collector and historian Michael Keating. It was a pleasant visit and insightful as we discussed decoys, stories, and "stuff." At one point during the visit, as Michael was viewing the weight collec-

tion, he asked me if he might purchase a single anchor to attach to one of his great early Susquehanna Flats decoys. If my memory serves me accurately, I had at that moment 444 of the weights displayed. Michael needed only one, but as a general rule, I prefer to maintain either even numbers of things or a number that holds some significance to me. I quickly determined that I could not part with even one. That fateful decision has led to some comments by Michael and a few of his close associates with whom he has shared the tale.

Why, one might ask was that one weight or that number of weights so meaningful? I would respond that it wasn't just the one; it wasn't the number 444, because now that number has grown to well over 500—a good even number. More important than the number is the history that they represent and the fact that this "weighty collection" tells a story to all who see them.



Private, non-profit organizations are particularly vulnerable and museums are no exception. The Havre de Grace Decoy Museum has been very fortunate to have the strong support of its members during these trying times. Many museums have not been so fortunate and have had to reduce their hours of operation and eliminate or curtail programs. We are proud to say that our Decoy Museum remains in full operation and open 7 days per week.

The Board of Directors and staff of the Havre de Grace Decoy Museum thank you for your continued support. Your donations, dues, purchases, and other financial support are greatly appreciated.

There is another area where member assistance would be very helpful. That is "decoys." Many of us have decoys packed away in attics, garages, and basements. 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
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
