


Lori Maslin for their assistance with the application. We are the first museum in Maryland to be included on the list of environmentally conscious businesses. Our name is among a group of other businesses that are making an effort to conserve and protect our environment. We received a letter noting this accomplishment from State Governor Martin O'Malley.

The Voice of America visited Havre de Grace this past July and I was honored to have been interviewed by June Soh. Ms. Soh is an award-winning international journalist. She spent hours in Havre de Grace, touring the Museum, greeting Captain Bob Jobes and his son Casey as they pulled into the yacht basin with their day's harvest of blue crabs. After a visit with Captain Bob at his decoy shop, Ms. Soh toured Mitch Shank's home and decoy collection then completed her visit at the decoy shop of Jeannie Vincenti. The video is broadcast into 133 countries and translated into 44 languages.

The Maryland Comptroller, Peter Franchot visited Havre de Grace in August and walked the promenade from the lighthouse to the Museum. His tour of the Museum was concluded with a reception on the second floor. The Comptroller wrote the Museum following his visit and was highly complimentary of all that is here. I will repeat myself and comment that we all seem to take for granted what we have and only a set of new eyes can truly appreciate the magnitude of our wonderful Museum.

It is my pleasure to announce to our membership and visitors that after three years the second floor deck will soon be open again to all. The deck was in need of a major renovation and the finances were not there to move forward and replace it.

However, The R. Madison Mitchell Trust had a unique opportunity to enter into a partnership with Todd Pauliny, RBC Wealth Management, the Ed Funk family, the City

of Havre de Grace, MacGregor's Restaurant, IMARK Builders, Bill Denny's Automotive Inc., Harford Refrigeration, Pollitt Signs, and other corporate and private donors to make this renovation possible.

After meeting and discussing a plan of attack, bids were submitted for this project by several contractors and IMARK builders was selected. IMARK's Mark Gorrera has worked with the Museum in the past on several capital projects, so it was felt he truly knew the building inside and out. Soon after the renovation started the scope of the project widened to include the entire front façade of the building. As a result of their efforts IMARK and their contractors have done a spectacular job. So please, when you visit the Museum walk onto the new Ed Funk Observation Deck (weather permitting) and take advantage of the grand view of the Susquehanna Flats and the Chesapeake Bay.

Also, in order to improve the grand view from the deck, a second partnership came together to enhance the shoreline between the promenade and the Museum. After discussions with the Critical Area Commission, Griff Evans—Ecological Restoration & Management, The Mitchell Trust, Decoy Museum, City of Havre de Grace, Delta Waterfowl, and Maryland Ducks Unlimited are working with Steven Hillyer and the students of Havre de Grace High School Environmental Program, to enhance and promote the growth of native vegetation in this area.


# I PRODUCTION

For a number of years, the Havre de Grace Decoy Museum Board of Directors has considered adding a "wax" figure of its first President, Jimmy Pierce, to the Second Floor Gallery. Well, now it is going to happen.

hrough the efforts of a special committee established for this specific purpose by your Board, a

high quality museum figure producer has been identified and is now under contract to create such a figure. It is our hope that it will be done by early November 2011. After consulting with Jim Pierce and his family, it was decided to use as the model the picture on the front of the 1991 Decoy Festival booklet showing Jim working on a Wood Duck Drake, He was the 1991 Honorary Festival Chairman. Jim and his son Charlie have been meeting with the producer, Dorfman Figures in Baltimore, and will oversee the various steps in the process to ensure that the final product meets our high standards.

Now you may ask, where did the money for this project come from during these tough economic times? Good question! As you have read often in the Canvasback and in correspondence from the Museum, your Board of Directors and staff have made concerted efforts to maintain an adequate revenue stream to sustain full-time operation of the Museum. This has not been easy and has happened only because of the continued support of our members. I am pleased to report that this initiative is being funded from sourc-





es outside the regular Museum funding sources and will not impact our operating budget. A separate and very successful fund raising effort was coordinated by Charlie Pierce. As a result we raised enough to cover the cost of the figure (\$9,250). Additional funding for related expenses, such as the showcase, is in the works. It should be noted that similar outside fund raising was done for many of the figures currently in the gallery.

Why was Dorfman Figures in Baltimore chosen? For several reasons: (1) they

have been in business for a number of years with a reputation for producing high quality figures with other museums praising their work, (2) Jim Pierce met with the company representatives and visited the facilities—he is

satisfied with the procedure that will be followed to create his lifelike reproduction, (3) the cost to create this figure was reasonable and competitive with other companies that were explored, and (4) the company last used by the Museum is no longer in business.

The new figure will be on display in the second floor gallery, near the top of the steps. As you enter the gallery from the stairs, it will be to your immediate right. To the left is Charlie Joiner's figure and then Captain Harry Jobes'. This area is ideal to use because it welcomes you as you enter the gallery. The new exhibit location will allow the staff to utilize the original Jim Pierce case to display decoys from additional Honorary Chairs.

Ideally, we would like to unveil the Pierce figure at the 25th Anniversary Dinner being held on November 2, 2011, at the Museum in the second floor gallery. November 2nd was the actual Grand Opening date for the Havre de Grace Decoy Museum. Given the uncertainty of production process times, it may not be ready. If that is the case, Dorfman will be present to give an update and show slides of the figure in process and, of course, we will have the original Jim Pierce on hand to stand in. We are all hoping to have both there.

Invitations and tickets for the 25th Anniversary Celebration will be arriving soon. There is limited space, so please send in your RSVP cards early. ■


# Fow Weather Foils Duck Fair

# The Duck Fair scheduled for September 10, 2011, was cancelled due to flooding conditions in the Havre de Grace Area.

The excessive rainfall from the remnants of Hurricane Lee overloaded the Susquehanna River and resulted in the declaration of a State of Emergency due to extremely high river levels. The levels were expected to approach those of Hurricane Agnes, which were devastating. After consultation with Havre de Grace town officials, local public safety personnel, and event organizers, it was decided, in the interest of safety, to cancel the fair. The Board of Directors regrets any inconvenience this may have caused for our members, vendors, and visitors.

We are pleased to report that the Museum sustained no damage from the storm. Fortunately, the river did not crest at the anticipated levels and Havre de Grace was spared the level of devastation feared. As the weather began to clear on Saturday morning, the Museum was able to open to the public. Many, if not most, of our visitors that weekend were in the area to view the flood conditions. On a brighter note, the Gift Shop had a productive day, making more than enough to cover the expenses we had outlaid for the Fair.

The Museum had taken all reasonable precautions in preparation for the high water. All items on the lower level of the building were raised and sand bags were placed in all the flood prone areas. The Museum owes a special thanks to all those who participated in these preparations, including our President, Director of Operations, Event Coordinator, and staff. They planned for the worst and hoped for the best. All in all, the city and the Museum were very fortunate.



# Havre de Grace DECOY MUSEUM

oday this fine landmark museum is open daily and has a membership approaching 1,000. This year, their Decoy Festival marked its 30th consecutive event. The Festival and Museum have drawn tens of thousands of visitors over the years including US Presidents, governors, business leaders, hunting enthusiasts, art lovers, history buffs, tourists, and more. Its broad appeal offers something for everyone.

While major displays are geared to showcasing vintage and contemporary decoys, their makers, and the production process, much attention has been given the hunting tradition that gave birth to the decoy. A superb collection of the instruments used in conjunction with these "counterfeit wildfowl," such as a sinkbox, a sneak boat, punt guns and battery guns (tools of the trade for early "market gunners"), as well as many of more recent vintage still in use today is on display.

Showcased also are shotguns of gauges unheard of, or outlawed, today (4, 6, 8 etc); punt guns the size of small cannons; and other tools for the massive harvest

of waterfowl when it was plentiful, in demand, and legal.

As one tours the Museum, one immediately observes a historic rig from the early 1900's. About 200 wooden decoys displayed in a lay-out boat as they would have been transported at that time. The rig was assembled and hunted over by Frank "HomeRun" Baker from Trappe, Maryland. Frank played baseball with fellow Hall of Fame member Babe Ruth when with the New York Yankees, (Ruth was also an avid duck hunter). Frank was related to Madison Mitchell by marriage — small world! A book is currently in production by the Museum on Home Run Baker and his decoys.

A continued tour takes one through an elaborate display of decoy making paraphernalia once used by the master decoy makers. Also, audio/visual stations explain the process and give remarkable perspective on the early days of gunning the Chesapeake Bay. Moving on to an elaborate wood walkway, a close up view is provided of all the various vintage equipment



utilized in hunting over decoys, many long since outlawed.

Proceeding to the second floor, one observes hundreds of decoys by Chesapeake Bay area carvers. Not only samples from virtually every decoy maker past and present from the Upper Bay, but complete collections from many of the most renowned. Legendary figures such as Mitchell, Bryan, and Gibson have been honored with life size wax likenesses. In many cases, one of every species of waterfowl made by a Past Honorary Festival Chairmen is on display. Also housed on the second floor is an extensive library of decoy related books and documents which are available to members for perusal and research purposes.

Returning to the ground floor, a visit to the Museum's gift shop offers an opportunity to pick up a souvenir or a decoy locally produced by one of many local craftsmen. Finally, before leaving the grounds, a visit to the adjacent "Madison Mitchell Decoy Shop" is worthwhile. The actual building that Mr. Mitchell used for years to produce his now famous decoys has been preserved in its entirety and relocated on the Museum site.

On May 6, 7 & 8, 2011, the 30th Annual Havre de Grace Decoy Festival was held. The format and venue has been enhanced and now includes not only decoys and wildfowl art, but also a waterfowl hunting and conservation component housed in an adjacent community center.

Museum membership starts at only \$25 per year for individuals and \$40 for families. Members receive free admission, discounts at the gift shop, and a subscription to the Museum's magazine the "Canvasback." ■







he passion of a collector never rests. For those of you who followed the sitcom Seinfeld you will recall a great remark that Jerry Seinfeld made on one of his shows. It was in reference to men and the use of the television remote control device. He said "Men don't care what's on TV. They only care what else is on TV." When I was cleaning out my late mother's home, I found a small piece of paper placed inside what was to become her last journal; written on that paper was that exact quote and the date of the episode when Jerry had

uttered that line. Mom apparently felt that quote so appropriate for me that she had written it down and kept it where someday I was sure to uncover it. For collectors the expression of "what else is on" may be translated into "what else is out there?" or "what's next for me to discover?," for it is not so much a matter of what we have collected, but more like what will be our next great find.

In my long association with the late John M. M. Pusey, I collected many wonderful items from him. There were many great days of finding "stuff" in his buildings, things that were to me simply magnificent objects. Many of the items, which were to John just in his way, were coveted by me.

If time allowed, I often times considered writing a book about the items from the Puseys. I would have photos and captions and the story behind the particular "find." In 1985, I did exactly that with the publication of A Chronicle of Letters. That book was the result of finding a box of letters in the Pusey warehouse filled with papers from the McGaw estate. John Pusey was a close friend of McGaw and was a beneficiary of the estate. The letters had been stored since McGaw's death in 1958. Now fast forward to the summer of 2011, and John's son Joel Pusey calls me with yet another collection of just-found letters written to Robert F. McGaw, Jr., and his wife, Carrie Polhemus Moore McGaw. A great find and another excit-

ing chapter in this collector's life. But this collection is exciting to more than just me.

Joel decided that the best home for this collection is here at the Havre de Grace Decoy Museum. What a great choice for the Pusey family and what an incredible gift to the Museum. These letters provide a glimpse into, not just the McGaws, but to those writing to them.

The letters date from the late 1930s to the late 1940s. Some are quite brief and simply request decoys, or a price list for his decoys. Many of the letters misspell McGaw and do exactly what the modern day spell check does and refer to Mr. and Mrs. McGraw. Other letters are concerned with medical issues and bad times that old Bob was experiencing. One writer had shipped a damaged decoy for repair and made reference to it in a follow-up letter as "how is my cripple coming along." In 1943 an order came from New York from an Army Captain who had been stationed at Aberdeen in 1940. In it he asks: "I don't know what your prices are now but they were .75 cents each before."

A writer from New Jersey wrote a thank you reply after receiving their order noting that "they arrived in fine condition; my husband always did say that they were works of art." One letter requested that a catalog and price list describing decoys be shipped. One of the more intense writers wrote to McGaw from Baltimore in January of 1944; "I am most interested in Canvasback, Redhead, Blackhead, and American Goldeneye decoys. Also Canada goose decoys, I would also like to know how and of what wood they are constructed and how they are painted. I would also like to know the prices of your miniatures, I have seen some of your decoys and I think they are the best of the many different kinds I have seen."

Someone who was apparently quite rough on his decoys or perhaps a decoy maker himself wrote from Cortland, New York, ordering two dozen redheads and two dozen canvasbacks and requested heads only. In March 10, 1946 Mrs. Earnshaw Cook of Tuxedo Park, New

# 18TH ANNUAL

R. MADISON MITCHELL

BANQUET

The Eighteenth Annual R. Madison Mitchell Endowment Trust Banquet was a huge success. Lou Ward and the staff of the Bayou Restaurant hosted a capacity crowd of three hundred and five and did a superb job. It truly was an evening of celebration.

Born this day in 1901, Mr. Mitchell would have been 110 years old. The Decoy Museum was celebrating its 25th anniversary, and the Decoy Festival was celebrating its 30th anniversary. Cocktails and hors d'oeuvres started the evening while friends and supporters viewed the items available in the live and silent auctions. This year's lottery items were Wood Duck drakes and Madison Mitchell Black Ducks. The Wood Ducks were generously donated by the Bryan family, Gary and Jean Ross. Charlie Bryan started these decoys before he passed and they were completed for this evening by Bill Schauber. All of the decoys sold and they were well received.

This year's donation from the Mitchell Trust to the Museum's collection was made possible by Ed and Jane Zimmer. Their generous gift of an English Breech Loading Punt Gun in excellent condition made for quite an addition. Both Ed and Jane were on hand for the presentation.

Following the awards portion of the evening's program, auctioneer Zach Shelley began the live auction. The auctions highlight was two half-size decoys carved by Madison Mitchell in the 1950s. These decoys donated by Mitch Mitchell, were a part of Madison's personal collection. The decoys sold for three thousand dollars each. All of the proceeds from the live auction as well as the entire evening make it possible for the Trust to continue to fulfill its mission.

On behalf of the directors of the Mitchell Trust, we thank all of you who attended and donated to the annual banquet. Without your continued support Mr. Mitchell's goals could not be realized.







In early August, the long desired and much needed renovations began on the Museum's deck. The deck had been deemed unusable due to the deteriorating condition of the decking and the railing that was no longer up to safety code.

On August 9th IMark Builders began demolition of the deck. In no time the old decking was removed and years of debris and insects were cleaned up. Close inspection revealed years of water damage to the metal sheathing underneath requiring additional repairs.

With the replacement of the new deck underway, a few maintenance issues were addressed. The deck has been resealed and leaks fixed. The new planking on the deck is a UV resistant recycled plastic practically eliminating deck maintenance. The railing is made of the same UV and heat resistant materials and is stronger than the original railing. The front porch of the Museum was renovated to create a new and bolder look. The original support beams for the deck were originally covered with aluminum to create a column look. The aluminum was removed and blocks that match the ones used for the elevator were used to create new columns. New half-columns replaced the full ones on the front of the building and brown cap stones were incorporated to tie in the brown stones on the elevator addition. The front of the building and the elevator addition now appear to be one continuous building and newcomers will never realize there











had ever been an addition to the building. The overall effect, as one long-time Museum member stated, "It looks like a brand new building."

The exterior wall of the carving room was replaced. The carving room was originally part of the parking garage that was open to the outdoors. The opening had been framed out and covered. Over 25 years of weather, snow and minor flooding took its toll. The wall was replaced with block and a new steel security door added. The new wall looks as if it had always been part of the original building.

The deck renovation has solved a number of minor maintenance issues and will enhance the visitor's experience. The deck will now be open to the public and the view is wonderful. The next time you come to the Museum you will notice something missing. Several trees in front of the Museum near the promenade have been removed. A new native species replanting of vegetation and trees will occur. There are still minor renovations to be completed. IMark Builders did an outstanding job considering the flooding and what seems like neverending rainy days.

The Grand Re-opening and dedication of the deck will take place Wednesday, November 2, 2011, during the Anniversary Celebration. When you receive your invitation, make plans to attend and be one of the first to walk out and enjoy the view!


York, wrote a kind and gentle letter phrasing the beauty of the decoys she had received, and commented on the weather conditions at her home in New York stating that: "with the deep new-fallen snow, sparkling like sugar in the sun, and every twig coated with ice, we are having one of those perfect days that no human being could possibly complain about."

Most collectors of McGaw decoys are familiar with his full-size duck decoys and geese, but a few letters included orders for full-size swan decoys. The president of the Continental Life Insurance Company of Washington D.C. included in his letter of April 1944 not only his order for two full-size swan decoys, but a recommendation that Bob "drink the juice of a whole lemon in a little water three times a day with a teaspoonful of baking soda" as a cure for his arthritis. Those letters ordering swan, will spark a hope in dedicated collectors, that perhaps McGaw did create a few swan decoys.

Nearly 40 years ago, I did inspect two early swan decoys from this region of the bay. The swan were what a few of us refer to as "committee decoys." The swan heads and necks were carved by McGaw and perfectly fitted onto Madison Mitchell bodies. The match up was perfect and those old decoys were quite simply wonderful to behold.

This collection of letters reveal the depth of Robert F. McGaw's national reputation. Many of his customers had been stationed at the Aberdeen Proving Ground and began collecting in their days in the military community. After being transferred or moving out of the area, they maintained a relationship with Bob and Carrie McGaw. They were concerned with their medical conditions and suggested remedies and wished them good health.

Some made recommendations for personal reasons, one writer made a special request that Bob not use the typical desk blotter on the bottom of the miniature decoy bases but, rather a brightly colored felt. Whatever they included in their decoy orders, they show a genuine concern for the decoy manufacturer from Havre de Grace, for his health and his wife, and for the magnificent folk art he created.
