# DEGOY STATE OF THE PARTY OF THE

ART FESTIVAL 2016

The three-day annual Decoy & Wildlife Art Festival, now in its 35th year, was held the weekend of May 6-8 in the small historic waterfront community of Havre de Grace, Maryland. Begun in 1982, the Festival is the key annual fundraiser for the Havre de Grace Decoy Museum.

This year's Honorary Chairs were shared by highly regarded contemporary carver Shannon Dimmig of Elkton, Maryland, along with the young talented carving brothers Daniel and Jonathan Irons, ages 14 and 12 respectively, of Queenstown, Maryland. These young carvers have been carving ducks and other sea birds half of their lives, and can often be seen at local waterfowl shows demonstrating their carving techniques, as they did at this Festival.

Mother's Day weekend as well as heavy monsoon-like rains Friday, and intermittent rains Saturday, impacted vendor participation and Festival attendance. The bad weather virtually shut down the monthly "First Friday" celebrations in this community's small commercial downtown area. But the Museum's loyal vendors and other supporters are an intrepid lot, and the 2016 Festival was a success for vendors and visitors alike. The Decoy Museum's Festival issue of The Canvasback magazine, mailed in a timely



manner preceding the Festival, served as a roadmap for the various duck activities, times and venues.

An afterhours Friday evening exhibitor appreciation reception with light fare is held each year at the Museum's second-floorCarvers' Gallery. This year's reception also included the exhibit opening from John Collier's collection of Bill Gibian's fine bird carvings. The display included 24 finely carved and painted decorative birds, mostly waterfowl, that included wading birds, shorebirds, ducks and geese along with a few exotic birds. Among them is a stunning life-size Bald Eagle begun by Lem Ward and completed by Bill after Ward's death in 1984. Gibian, from Onancock, on Virginia's Eastern Shore, is well known to both the contemporary and the vintage decoy collector.

Carvers, demonstrations, and vendor events were held in three locations with most of the competitions and exhibitions held Saturday. Carvers were able to enter individual birds, some as floaters, for ribbon prizes in eight different carving competition categories. Gunning rig competitions were held in the tidal waters in front of the Museum, with the participants, in deep waders, setting their birds, again for competition ribbons. This is a fun event to watch as the live birds that abound are drawn into the rigs. There were also goose and duck calling competitions held Saturday as well as retriever dog demonstrations.

The Middle School contains the old decoy vendors along with a sprinkling of contemporary carver/vendors. However, the old decoys are the draw for the many vintage duck collectors who filled the aisles Friday evening and Saturday, looking for another old decoy to take home with them. From this writer's observation, there were many with purchased decoys under their arms. Show vendors report that Sunday's commerce was slow to non-existent. The Middle School was also the venue for the annual Old Decoy Contest.

Festival vendors reported that Sunday's commerce was slow to non-existent. This year was unusual in that the second Sunday of May (Mother's Day) was on the first full weekend of May (Decoy Festival). After two weeks of almost solid rain, Sunday dawned bright and clear, but the Sunday paper predicted another week of rain ahead. Consequently, we imagine that many families gave the special gift of staying home to work on Mom's outdoor "to-do" list.

Jim & Clo Trimble worked again this year as festival volunteers, taking responsibility and accepting decoys for the 10-category J. Evans McKinney Old Decoy Contest. Steve Dudley and Rod Benjamin worked as "duck handlers."

Decoy judge selection is on a yearly rotation basis with collectors John Sullivan, Chad Tragakis and Will Freng selected to serve. This writer serves as pinch-hitter, if and when one of the judges recuse because of possible conflict over a category entry. Twenty-four



contestants entered over 80 competition birds with nine separate entrants winning in this ten-category vintage competition event. The number of contestants and number of entry birds were down this year, reflecting the Mother's Day/Decoy Festival overlap.

Maryland collector John Sullivan won the Best Cecil County Black Duck category with a fine hollow Ben Dye Black Duck in mellow old gunning paint, circa 1880/90s. This fine bird also won 3rd Best-in-Show honors. The Best Harford County Black Duck category was won with a fine original paint bird by Jim Holly, circa 1885 from the Boyd rig; owned by Delaware collector Lloyd Sheats. This bird also won 2nd Best-in-Show honors. Sheats struck again when his fine original paint pair of Jim Holly Bluebills won the Best Holly Family Diving Duck category.

Another Delaware collector, S.R. Smith, won the Dye Family Diving Duck category with a Civil War era Ben Dye Redhead in mellow old gunning paint. The Best Graham Family Diving Duck category was won by Pennsylvania collector Jeremy Houser with a high-head John Graham Canvasback hen with fine old paint and with a P.K. BARNES brand.

Maryland collector Mort Kramer won the Jobes Family Canvasback category with a circa 1950s original paint Canvasback hen made by family patriarch Capt. Harry Jobes. A fine original paint August Heinifield Canvasback, circa 1940/50s, won the Best Queen



This duck-packed weekend, courtesy of the sponsors, staff, and volunteers of the Havre de Grace Decoy Museum, is always a fun weekend for like-minded duck enthusiasts. It is truly a celebration of the history, heritage, and cultural landscape of the Upper Chesapeake Bay. We have already marked our calendar for the 2017 Festival that will he held, as always, on the first full weekend of May – the 5th, 6th, and 7th.

# 19th Annual East Coast Decoy Collectors Swap Meet:

April 8th & 9th, 2016 - St. Michaels, Maryland

ost vendors arrived and opened by mid-afternoon Thursday for the buy-sell-swap held Friday & Saturday, April 8th & 9th, at the St. Michaels Motor Inn in St. Michaels, Maryland. Thursday's heavy rain gave way to Friday's sunshine, with a rough mixture front of high winds, cold, rain and snow showers Saturday that impacted day-hop visitors. There were fifty or so rooms chockfull of old decoys and gunning artifacts; as well as 17 or so tailgaters, again with decoys and waterfowling artifacts. Reservation issues, due to the motel dropping their Best Western reservation system, impacted and dampened the enthusiasm of a few.

Vendors were primarily represented by members of various East Coast decoy collectors' clubs that include the Thousand Islands, Long Island, New Jersey, Delaware Valley, Potomac, Palmetto State and Carolina Collectors clubs. As this show has grown, it has drawn many collectors from across the country, who not only enjoy the show, but are able to preview decoys at the nearby Guyette & Deeter corporate headquarters for their forthcoming Pheasant Run auction.

As in the past, savvy local collectors were on hand Thursday to see and buy what was in the off-load offering. Commerce was instantaneous. Free appraisals as part of the event advertisement in Eastern Shore newspapers drew some locals with old decoys that included, among others, a rig of 1950s Madison Mitchell Canvasbacks and a diminutive palm-sized worn original paint Tom Parsons Bufflehead.

Most vendors shut down late Friday afternoon to attend a new waterfowling exhibit preview party, with food and drink, at the Chesapeake Bay Maritime Museum's old boat house that was sponsored by ECDC members Henry Stansbury and the auction firm of Guyette & Deeter. The new artifact exhibit entitled "Chesapeake Ammo, Camo & Calls," features the transformation

of Chesapeake waterfowling gear, tools and clothing, as it evolved from simple to sophisticated over the past 100 plus years. The exhibit displays many prized gunning artifacts from ECDC membership.

Some collectors took this opportunity, not only to sell, but to also display some of their favorite decoys. Maryland collector Will Freng's three-bird fine original paint display included a Harry V. Shourds, circa 1900, Redhead with JEB brand, a 1910 Mason Premier Mallard drake, and a Harry M. Shourds Black Duck, that was purchased directly from Harry M's son Harry V. Shourds II. All three birds were spectacular!

Maryland collector Don Kirson's display never disappoints. This year featured a five-bird display of original paint decoys from three different decoy makers. The pair of Ward Bros. "Bishop Head" Wigeons, circa 1928, garnered many comments, as did his pair of circa 1919 Sam Hutchins (Jones Fall, Ontario) Goldeneyes with carved cross hatching. Capt. Charles Osgood (Salem MA) Merganser hen, circa 1880, rounded out this grouping of fine birds.

Maryland collectors Ron & Kim Newcomb's display featured seven unique canvass covered unknown maker birds from the first quarter of the last century that included four stick-up geese, two of them with horsehair covered necks, two Brant floaters with canvass covered heads, and a Dorchester County flying Merganser complete with canvass-covered spread wings. The Newcomb's entire room, is set-up each year, sale birds inclusive, like a small museum display.

With a forecast of cold heavy rains, gusting winds, and possible snow, some vendors packed it in Friday afternoon with a handful more shutting down early Saturday with the heavy rains. The catered membership cookout, for the first time in our 19-year history at this location, was moved inside, where 84 or so enjoyed good food, good





drink, comradery, and fine music by local balladeer Anna Burgess. et's get right to the bottom line... Bill Gibian's wildfowl carvings are phenomenal, and we are grateful to John Collier for sharing part of his collection with us. If a picture is worth a thousand words, I can hardly advance this story more than these great pictures that Scott Moody spent an evening composing for us.

Born in Passaic, New Jersey, Bill Gibian now lives a world away in Onancock on the Eastern Shore of Virginia. His aptitude for art came from his mother, a self-taught artist herself who worked in many media and who encouraged Bill's interest in drawing and model building from an early age. In later years, working for his father's plastic rotational molding factory provided an outlet for his nascent mechanical and artistic aptitudes.

Bill's grandfather was an avid birder whose binoculars and a book by John James Audubon gave Bill a start in learning about waterfowl and their special characteristics. Most of his knowledge of birds has come from looking through binoculars and a camera rather than sighting down the barrel of a shotgun, and observation of birds and their whimsical behaviors in their natural habitat have provided perhaps the greatest influence on his style and pattern designs. "You must observe the live birds to understand their habits and colors," he says.

Bill's carvings are far more elegant than gunning decoys, but he has not attempted to duplicate the fine detail of many decorative birds, such as feathering with a wood burner or dental drill. What sets Bill's carvings apart are the detailed painting, the true-to-life coloration, and the blending rendered meticulously in oils. He applies the darkest colors first and layers on the lighter ones. The result is a mellow mixture and iridescence that provides a visual depth.


Notably, Bill poses his carvings with attention to animation based on his observations of the natural behaviors of the birds – with turned heads, raised or dropped wings, and open bills – so they appear to be frozen in an instant of motion, as if they were a single frame cropped from a movie.


Bill says, "Each bird is like a brand new experience." As he finishes one, he is left with questions as to "why I didn't do this or try that," and he incorporates lessons learned as he goes along. "I want to make each new bird better than the one before."

Bill names carver Mark McNair as providing early encouragement after he moved to the Delmarva Peninsula in 1981. The carvings of Bill Bowman and Elmer Crowell were major influences on the development of his own style. Northern white cedar is Bill's preferred wood, and many of his birds are hollow to reduce their tendency to crack as the wood dries and ages.

Bill's work over the past 30 years has produced an impressive following. Among his devotees is Severna Park, Md. collector John Collier (www.pottercoy.com) whose collection is so extensive that he kindly offered to share with the Decoy Museum and its visitors the two-dozen creations displayed on these pages.

John knows a thing or two about decoys. He has hunted since he was 10-years old and growing up on Locust Point in





tephen Ward (1895-1976) and Lemuel T. Ward, Jr. (1896-1984) were legendary and prolific carvers from the small town of Crisfield on the Eastern Shore of Maryland. Barbers by trade, they were also decoy makers. In the 1950s they began a transition from gunning decoys to make some of the most beautiful decorative decoys ever created and called themselves "Wildfowl Counterfeiters in Wood". Such was their renown that they were featured in National Geographic magazine and honored by the National Endowment for the Arts. They are the namesakes of the Ward Museum at Salisbury University.

Steve Ward had carved a bald eagle at one time. Out of respect for his brother's artistry, Lem promised Steve that he would never make an eagle while Steve was alive. After Steve's death, Lem carved his own eagle but died before he had a chance to finish it. There it sat in the shop and later in the house of his daughter Ida Ward Linton with a coat of primer and covered with a cloth. Finally, it became a distant memory. There was talk among collectors of a Lem Ward eagle "out there somewhere", but the line between myth and reality blurred.

Fast forward... Collector John Collier quietly acquired the unfinished eagle from Ida in recent years with the objective to see that it was properly completed. John engaged Bill Gibian to make any necessary repairs and paint the eagle, which he did splendidly. It became a little-known element of John's collection.

When the Decoy Museum executive director and volunteers went to John's house to pick up this fine collection that he has let us put on exhibit, volunteer Matt Kneisley mentioned the legendary Lem Ward eagle wondering if there could be an element of truth to the stories. With a nod of his head, John indicated, "That is the Lem Ward eagle."

Myth crashed head-on into reality. The eagle was tenderly carried from John's house and now sits proudly in the Decoy Museum where the fusion of the skills of two great wildfowl artists can be admired by all.



# **Annapolis Decoy Show**

he Potomac Decoy Collectors Association's (PDCA) inaugural Annapolis Decoy Show was held Sunday, June 12th at the spacious and well-lit Annapolis Elks Lodge. 60 tables were leased to 40 vendors which included three area waterfowl related museums as well as the local chapter of Ducks Unlimited. Besides seasoned decoy vendors, there were several PDCA members who took this opportunity to thin-out their collections. Show hours were ten to four with no admission charge. The show appeared to be well attended, drawing collectors from the mid-Atlantic region. This area has not hosted a decoy show since the early 1990s. PDCA President Chad Tragakis, who was pleased with the vendor quality, variety and number of visitors, also expressed that he was delighted to bring a decoy show back to the Annapolis area after a 25-year void. Downtown colonial Annapolis is a tourist Mecca and several of those in attendance planned their day to include a stroll of the downtown waterfront and enjoy its abundance of fine eateries and boutique shops.

Vendor tables were primarily loaded with vintage decoys and other waterfowl related artifacts as well as vintage oyster related stuffs. Contemporary decoy vendors included blue ribbon carvers Ray Whetzel, Bruce Eppard & Eddie Wozny. A display of about 40 or so Annapolis/Anne Arundel County vintage decoys by local seasoned collector/vendors Dick Larrimore and Eric Steinline was well done and well received. The decoys are somewhat unique to this area of the Chesapeake's western shore and included maker identification and/or family made or rig attribution. In the parking lot, one local stopped and showed me a Jim Currier hi-head canvasback that he had purchased from vendor Larrimore, complete with item description that included the Annapolis gunning rig from whence it came. This collector was pleased with his purchase. He related that as a kid, he had been in and out of the rig owner's home many times and well remembers the numerous baskets of old gunning decoys.

Tragakis reported that the feedback and show results were positive and advises that the PDCA group is planning on a return to Annapolis and that there is already a vendor waiting list for next year's show. Tragakis also commented: "Public education is a big part of what PDCA is trying to do with this show," He pointed out and discussed the unique Annapolis/Anne Arundel decoy display, the free identifications and valuations that club members provided, and further noted the positive impact of the three Chesapeake Bay area museums that celebrate decoys as well as the local chapter of Ducks Unlimited that chose to participate. The Potomac Decoy Collectors Association is located in the metropolitan Washington DC area and its membership includes directors of East Coast waterfowl related museums, publishers of decoy related periodicals, authors of decoy related books, plus several contributing writers to various decoy related magazines.


