recently taken several steps to improve our aging infrastructure at the Museum. We have also taken steps to improve our "curb appeal" by relandscaping the front façade.


An effort is underway to update the Museum's Strategic Plan. The current version (August 1997) is very comprehensive and well written, but it is very dated and is in dire need of an update. Several carvers who have worked side by side with Mr. Mitchell have agreed to come together as a special committee to develop an automated audio and possible video presentation. This effort will include LED lighting to highlight areas of the shop and paint area and allow our visitors to hear directly from those who worked with Mr. Mitchell in these surroundings. We expect to advance this initiative in the second half of 2020.

Lastly, the 39th Decoy & Wildlife Art Festival is drawing near. Please make plans to join us on May 2 & 3, 2020 at the Havre de Grace Middle School and Decoy Museum to celebrate this exciting event. We hope to build on the momentum we experienced at last year's festival.

As always, we thank every one of you for your support in the past and look forward to your continued support as we prepare the Museum for the next decade and beyond.



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J. Evans McKinney Old Decoy Contest

he 18th annual J. Evans McKinney Old Decoy Contest will be held on Saturday, May 2nd at the Middle School Gym in conjunction with the 2020 Havre de Grace Decoy and Wildlife Art Festival. Joe Engers, Editor and Publisher of Decoy Magazine, will head up a threemember judge's panel. Entries will be accepted at the stage area from 10:00 a.m. until judging commences at noon. Competition decoys will be kept in a highly visible roped-off secure area and will not be handled by the public. At approximately 1:00p.m., the public will be invited to review the roped-off and secured tables once the judges have made their selections. A blue ribbon will be awarded for each of the following ten category winners, and the judges will also select a best-in-show winner. Winners will be requested to display their decoys and ribbons at the Havre de Grace Decoy Museum for six months following the Festival.

Rules: There is a competition ban, regardless of category, on last year's winning birds. Participants must make their best efforts to ensure that all decoy entries were made prior to 1950. Matched pairs entered in other than a Matched Pair category will be considered as one entry. There will be no restrictions as to those who can participate or number of categories entered; however, each decoy will be limited to only one competition category and participants are restricted to no more than three birds per category. Competition issues will be resolved at the sole discretion of the competition chairman and/or competition chief judge. 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
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

A New Landscape at the Havre de Grace Decoy Museum

During the summer of 2019, the Museum decided to embark on a project to remove the existing foliage in front of the building and replace it with new landscaping. We partnered with Liam McKaig (an Eagle Scout candidate from Troop 238, Hickory, MD) who made this effort his Eagle Scout Service Project. Teams comprised of members of Troop 238 and some friends of the Decoy Museum in conjunction with some commercial partners began the project in earnest on Labor Day weekend.

Stage I of the project involved the planning for the entire effort. It was learned early on that the Museum property lies in the Chesapeake Bay Critical Area and all new foliage was required to be Maryland native plants. Working closely with commercial partners Diane Klair (*City of Havre de Grace Planning*), John Akehurst (*Akehurst Landscaping*) and David Farrow (*Holly Hill Farm*), Liam and his team arrived at a concept that satisfied all the requirements of the City of Havre de Grace and the Decoy Museum. Special thanks to John Akehurst for drawing a concept from which we worked.

Stage II of the project involved the removal of all existing foliage. This stage went according to plan and presented no complications that were unexpected. The existing foliage was cut down using hand tools and the roots were removed using a small backhoe and hauled away for disposal. The soil was sampled, chemically tested and determined to be deficient to sustain the new plants. We were advised by one of our partners, Holly Hill Farm, to remove twelve inches of soil and replace it with more suitable top soil to give the new plants their best chance for survival.

Stage III saw all the old soil excavated, hauled away and replaced with new soil. This stage was heavily dependent on DXI Construction (*alocal contractor who provided heavy equipment and dump trucks*). Prior to

the soil replacement, it was discovered that the stucco was delaminating on parts of the Museum's exterior walls. Mark Gorrera *(Imark Builders)* was gracious enough to make the repairs and repaint the parts of the building that required it at no cost. The old soil removal proved much more challenging than originally expected. The drought conditions of the late summer/ early fall made excavation very difficult. The new soil *(provided at no charge by DXI Construction)* was placed onto our site

without complication. Liam and his team completely hand raked the landscape areas and removed all rocks and debris that were present. A few large landscape boulders (*obtained at Wirtz & Daughters, Joppa, MD*) were used to accent the planting area.

The last stage of the project Stage IV saw 286 Maryland native plants (provided by Holly Hill Farm at a reduced cost) planted in our landscape area. David Farrow graciously came to lay out each plant to ensure its placement was consistent with the landscape plan. Once the plants were in position, Liam and his team dug the holes and inserted the plants. Once an area was planted, Liam led a separate team of volunteers to spread mulch (provided at a *reduced cost by Wirtz & Daughters*). Once the mulching was complete, the entire area was cleaned, and the excess mulch was relocated to the rear of the Museum for future use.

As an accent to our new landscape project, the Museum Board of Directors approved the contracting of Harris Metalsmith Studio (Perruville, MD) to design and fabricate fullsize, three-dimensional aluminum flying waterfowl that give the appearance of flying from the Museum landscape area towards the Susquehanna Flats. It is currently envisioned that geese and canvasback ducks will be used. We thank County Executive Barry Glassman and Harford County Government for their generous support of this outdoor art project. It is our intention to light this outdoor artwork using LED lights and repair the pole lighting in the same area to provide an inviting area for visitors to the Promenade.

Liam McKaig and the Museum would like to thank the many volunteers that made this project successful. Special thanks to James K. Pierce for operating all heavy equipment and dump trucks. His countless volunteer hours were instrumental for the success of this project. Liam and the Decoy Museum would like to thank the Susquehanna Flats Chapter of Delta Waterfowl who provided major financial support to this effort. The Museum extends our thanks to Liam McKaig for his tireless effort in completing this project. We wish him luck as he completes his Eagle Scout requirements. We look forward to seeing our new Eagle Scout at the Museum on Friday, May 1 when we plan to reveal the new outdoor artwork.

CAPT. JEFF COATS, HONORARY CHAIRMAN OF THE 39TH ANNUAL DECOY & WILDLIFE ART FESTIVAL

Capt. Jeff Coats leads a very full life – he is a decoy carver, a guide and owner of both Pitboss Waterfowl and Pitboss Fishing, a radio/video personality, and a social media icon.

eff was born in Havre de Grace in 1965 and, like so many others, started carving decoys in order to hunt over them. His first attempt came in 1992, when he saw a pattern for a blue-winged teal in a magazine and decided to give it a go. So, he headed to the local hardware store to purchase some pine 2"x6" boards. All said and done, it didn't look too much like a duck, per Jeff, but it was his.

The next year, 1993, proved to be much more influential for this fledgling carver. That year, Jeff's mother purchased a decoy from local carver Patrick Vincenti as a gift for Jeff. He was so inspired by this gift that he began spending time at Pat's shop in Churchville, learning from both Pat and Capt. Bill Collins, who was working in the same shop. While Jeff

would eventually latch onto a style different than the typical Upper Bay decoy, to this day he credits Pat, Capt. Bill, George Williams and Tom Matus as his biggest mentors.

1993 was also the first year that Jeff attended the Havre de Grace Decoy Festival. However, it wasn't until 1995 that he decided to try his hand at carving a rig *(in this case, 4 drakes and 2 hens)* of black ducks for the River Gunning competition. He had done some carving in the interim years, but was looking for more consistency, in both his carving and painting, and thought that maybe he could earn a ribbon to boot. As was his preference, he carved the black ducks in a flat bottom style. He chose Chesapeake tan cork for his bodies, basswood for the heads, glass eyes and Ronan oil paint. At the time, he didn't have a bandsaw of his own, so he recalls using the bandsaw in Pat's shop to rough cut the heads and has fond memories of Capt. Collins helping him to refine the details. As for painting the black ducks, he imitated the scratch painting technique he had seen Pat and Bill utilize.

Jeff was quite proud of his rig of black ducks; however, he recalls feeling very humbled upon seeing the other entrants floating on the Flats that day. He did not receive a ribbon and, in fact, recalls receiving some pretty harsh criticism from another carver. However, that experience motivated him to improve his skills and propelled him into the competition world. He would go on to compete in the Decoy Museum's rig competition for the next several years and he did achieve his goal of earning some ribbons (*being awarded Best of Show in 2001, 2002 & 2003, one for the Rigs and two for the River Single Bird.*). He also competed in carving competitions in New York, New Jersey, Maryland, Virginia, North Carolina, Pennsylvania and Ohio.

Through the years, Jeff continued to fine tune his carving skills. Today, he utilizes tan high density cork as well as north white cedar for bodies and that same cedar for all of his heads. All birds have glass eyes and for paint, he uses either Goldens Heavy Body Matte or oils.

In the mid-1990s, Jeff found himself at a career crossroads of sorts and needed to make a change. An avid waterfowler, he was interested in doing something which sparked his passion. He recalls befriending a fellow waterfowler, Donald Hughes of Dorcester County, who would later become the catalyst for Jeff's career as a guide. The two men hunted together for quite a few years. In 1999, Jeff obtained his captain's license and Pitboss Waterfowl was born.

Seeing a unique need and opportunity for sea duck guiding, Jeff chose this particular specialty. At the time, he had a 17

ft. TDB *(The Duck Boat Company)* boat. Initially, Jeff utilized all plastic decoys for his hunts, but he quickly turned to hand carved birds, first using his own brant decoys. As with all start-ups, things were a bit tough at first; however, 20 years later, business is booming!



In 2006 and 2007, Jeff added the title "TV Personality" to his repertoire. During those years, he hosted the wildly popular outdoor shows Migration Nation and Ducks, Dog & Decoys TV, helping to promote his love of waterfowling traditions. He often visited the Museum to film segments for his shows.

Speaking of dogs, like many waterfowl hunters, a retriever has always played a huge role in Jeff's life. And in 2013, he first met his lovely wife, Karen *(a veterinary tech)* thanks to his 5 black labs. According to Karen, "everyone knew when Mr. Coats arrived with all 5 dogs for a visit." In 2015, Jeff and Karen moved to Berlin, MD and started Pitboss Fishing. The two were married in 2017 and today, she is very much a part of his guiding business. Jeff served on the Decoy Museum's Board of Directors from 2011 through 2015. As a Board Member during those years, he was most actively involved in the planning of the Annual Decoy Festival. In 2013, he also organized the Museum's first-ever 5K, which was held in September in conjunction with Waterfowl Day. Over 80 runners (including this writer) participated in the event, weaving through the downtown streets of beautiful Havre de Grace.

Today, Jeff works non-stop at his guiding business. During the off-hunting seasons, he is busy planning and scheduling the next year's trips. For anyone interested in booking, call now because his calendar fills quickly! And as anyone who is on social media knows, he works daily at marketing his business and keeping up his brand.

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
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Crowbills, Mudhens, Blue Peters Interpretations of the Coot Decoy

f it looks like a duck, swims like a duck, rafts and eats with the ducks, it's probably a duck. Unless it's a coot. American coot (Fulica americana) are often mistaken for ducks, but they belong to the Rallidae family of birds. Coots are smallish birds, about the size of a teal or ruddy duck, with long necks and compact heads. They have short, broad, off-white bills that end sharply, and a distinctive cream or bone-colored facial plate or "frontal shield" with a reddish-brown spot near the top of the bill between their deep red eyes. Their legs and long lobed toes are entirely different from the familiar webbed feet seen on ducks.

There is no difference in the appearance of male and female coots, but females are slightly smaller. They prefer freshwater, frequenting ponds, marshes and rivers, but also visit saltwater environments in winter. Coots are omnivorous, eating a variety of plants and algae, but also fish, snails, insects and worms, diving, foraging and scavenging on land.

These ubiquitous, migratory duck-like birds enjoy a variety of nicknames among hunters, including black coot, gray coot, crowbill, crow-duck, mud-hen, water-hen, water chicken, sea chicken, marsh hen, moor hen, sea-crow, mudcoot, marsh chicken, pond hen and white-billed mud-hen. In an 1894 piece in The Oölogist titled, Maryland Birds That Interest the Sportsman, William H. Fisher writes that: "This bird is often shot and sold in market as the Crow-bill Duck. They are poor eating being rank and fishy." In southern Louisiana, where the birds are often used in gumbo (probably the best way to cook them given their fishy taste), they are referred to as "poule d'eau," French for "water hen".

For many decoy collectors, it is the coot that represents the "cutest" piece on their shelves, as the diminutive size, dainty proportions and unusual features of this species seem to lend themselves to small and whimsical carvings. In terms of their natural distribution, American coots are found in abundance across the country. By the early 20th century, they were commonly hunted in Michigan, Illinois and Wisconsin in the mid-west, and Virginia, North Carolina and Louisiana in the south. 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During the "golden age" of waterfowling, coot hunting in the Upper Chesapeake Bay region was a sideline activity at best, so decoys of this species of an early vintage made there are unusual. Some early gunners used a few coot decoys on the outer edges of

their rigs as confidence birds, and that purpose was likely the genesis for the creation of most early examples.

The Potomac Decoy Collectors Association is delighted to present an exhibition of more than 50 coot decoys from member collections, featuring vintage working examples, contemporary gunning birds and beautiful decorative carvings. Among those on display are works by Chesapeake Bay makers Sam Barnes, Charles Nelson Barnard, Severn Hall, James Baines, Madison Mitchell, Paul Gibson, John Glenn, Jess Urie, George Edwards, Jr., Bob Litzenberg, Jim Pierce and Captain Harry Jobes. Virginia and Carolina makers represented include Miles Hancock, Blanton Saunders, Jimmy Rowe, Joshua Goodrich, Grandy Henley and Albert Twiford.

Factory examples on display include coot decoys from the William E. Pratt Company, the Wildfowler Decoy Company, the Herter's Decoy Company and the Carry-Lite Decoy Company. Contemporary makers featured include Bruce Eppard, David Farrow, Matt Kneisley, George "Coot" Garton, Mark Daisey and Herb Daisey, Jr. Additionally, several wonderful coot decoys by unknown makers are also featured, including examples from France and England.

In his timeless 1965 survey, American Bird Decoys, Bill Mackey, in addressing the collectability of coot decoys, says this of the little birds: "For good measure, and also because there is nowhere else to include it, we add the

> American Coot or 'blue peter,' which isn't a duck but a first cousin of the gallinules and rails. Though factual, heartless viewers describe them as clumsy, gawky birds with a silly countenance, from the collector's viewpoint some of the cutest, most interesting decoys are of these appealing little bird clowns."

As any collector with a good coot decoy on the shelf can attest, it's pretty hard to argue with that.

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Museum Improvements

If you haven't been to the Museum recently, things might look a bit different when you do visit. The past six months have seen a whirlwind of improvements meant to address our aging infrastructure and to improve the visitor experience. Some of these improvements have been made possible through a matching grant from the Maryland Heritage Areas Authority, with a portion of the Museum's match being funded by the R. Madison Mitchell Endowment. The remainder of the improvements have been made possible thanks to a very generous gift from the Carolyn Hargis estate. We are extremely grateful for the support of our many friends and sponsors.

In early October 2019, the stucco on the building's exterior was repaired due to delamination and sections of the building were power washed and repainted *(courtesy of Imark Builders)*. In late October, we replaced the carpet in our Museum Store, in the 2nd Floor Library, in the elevator and on the stairwell. An inefficient pump station *(to pump oil from the tanks on the lower level to the higher levels)* was replaced in early December. Just prior to Christmas, two oil-fired furnaces were replaced on the second floor after the Museum experienced smoke alarms from the existing furnaces due to a malfunction of these units. During the final week of December, all South-facing patio doors and windows in the Carvers Gallery were tinted to reduce the cooling load in that area and to better protect our displays from potential UV damage.

Improvements covered under the matching grant include 1) the enlargement of the building's chimney to improve efficiency, which was done in late October and 2) completion of our LED lighting project which began in 2017 with the installation of track lighting over the center exhibits in our 2nd floor Carver's Gallery. During February of 2020, an additional section of track lighting was installed over the exhibits along the rear wall of the Carver's Gallery. Similar to the first "round" of track lighting which was wired to activate via motion sensor, this new section is also on motion sensor. Not only does this lighting beautifully enhance the decoys on display, but it provides tremendous energy efficiency as well. Furthermore, all lighting in the Library, Museum Store, hallways, and the Gunning the Flats Gallery has been converted to LED. I must say, it truly is amazing how light can change the appearance of items!

Finally, we upgraded all Museum computers (*most of which were many years outdated*) in November 2019 and staff members are thrilled to have some new functionalities to better serve our guests.

Again, thanks to those who have made all of these things possible to keep your Museum moving forward in the 21st century!


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



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THE CURSE OF THE LABRADOR DUCK


FOCUS ON EDUCATION

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
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
